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PRICES RECEIVED INDEX DOWN 2 POINTS PARITY INDEX UP 1 POINT PARITY RATIO 74

The Index of Prices Received by Farmers declined 2 points (1 percent) during the month ended August 15 to 232 percent of its 1910-14 average, the Crop Reporting Board announced today. Lower prices for potatoes, cotton, tomatoes, and hogs contributed most to the decline. Partly offsetting were seasonally higher prices for milk and eggs. The index was 4 percent below August 1963 and the lowest for the month since 1955.

The Index of Prices Paid by Farmers, including Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates, rose 1 point (1/3 of 1 percent) to 313 on August 15, the same as in June. Numerous changes in prices paid were almost offsetting, but increases slightly overshadowed the declines. The mid-August Index was about 1 third of 1 percent higher than in August 1963.

With prices farmers paid averaging slightly higher, and farm product prices lower, the Parity Ratio moved back to 74. This was 1 percent under July and 5 percent below a year earlier.

PRICES RECEIVED BY FARMERS

POTATOES, SWEETPOTATOES, AND DRY EDIBLE BEANS: A sharp decline in potato and sweetpotato prices lowered the index 20 percent during the month to 247 percent of its 1910-14 average. Potato prices, at \$2.95 per cwt., were 78 cents below July, primarily because of increased marketings of the late summer crop. Sweetpotatoes, at \$4.94 per cwt., were down \$3.05 as marketings increased. Despite the decline during the month, the index was 24 percent above August 1963 and the highest for the month since 1952.

COTTON: Prices received by farmers for upland cotton declined 6 percent during the month to average 30.57 cents per pound in mid-August. This decline resulted mainly from a shift to sales of new-crop cotton and reflects changes in the support program; a month earlier, most sales consisted of cotton redeemed from CCC loan stocks. Upland cotton prices were down 5 percent from August 1963.

DAIRY PRODUCTS: The dairy products index rose 4 percent during the month to 252, with a seasonal increase in wholesale milk prices the principal contributing factor. Farmers received an average of \$4.10 per cwt. for milk sold wholesale to plants and dealers in August, 16 cents above July. The index was slightly higher than in August 1963. Prices for fluid market milk averaged \$4.54, the same as a year earlier, while manufacturing grade milk brought \$3.20 per cwt., 3 cents above August 1963.

COMMERCIAL VEGETABLES: A seasonal decline in vegetable prices lowered the commercial vegetable index 8 percent from July to 217. Contributing most to the decrease were sizeable price declines for tomatoes, celery, and cantaloupes, as marketings from northern areas became more general. Partly offsetting were higher prices for onions and lettuce. Although the index declined during the month, it was 12 percent above a year earlier and the highest for August since 1957.

POULTRY AND EGGS: A greater-than-seasonal advance in egg prices lifted the poultry and egg index 4 percent to 145. Turkey prices also were higher. Eggs, at 34.5 cents per dozen, were 9 percent above a month earlier, compared with the usual July-August advance of 6 percent. Lower prices for commercial broilers and farm chickens were partially offsetting. The index was 2 percent above a year earlier, mostly because of higher egg prices.

FRUIT: Higher prices for oranges were primarily responsible for a 4 percent advance in the fruit index to 283. Prices of old-crop California Valencia oranges, at \$4.10 per box, equivalent packinghouse-door returns, were 52 cents above a month earlier. Lemons, grapefruit, strawberries, and pears also were higher. Partly offsetting these increases were price declines for both apples and peaches, reflecting mainly increased marketings. The index was 3 percent above August 1963 and the highest for the month since 1958.

PRICES PAID BY FARMERS

The index of prices paid for goods and services bought by farmers as of August 15th remained at 282 percent of its 1910-14 average, the same as in May, June and July. It was about a third of 1 percent below a year ago.

Farm Production Index Unchanged

On August 15, the index of prices paid by farmers for goods used for production purposes was unchanged from a month earlier. At 269, the index was about 1 percent under a year earlier. A substantial decline in prices paid for feeder cattle was the primary factor accounting for the reduction from a year ago. Feed prices also were down. Prices for motor vehicles and farm machinery were higher than in August 1963.

FEEDER LIVESTOCK: During the month ended in mid-August, the index of prices paid for feeder and replacement livestock rose 2 percent to 301. This was 15 percent under August 15, 1963, and the lowest for August since 1956. A rise of 70 cents per 100 pounds in prices paid for feeder cattle and calves was primarily responsible for the upturn in the index from July to August of this year. Mid-August receipts of feeder cattle and calves at Mid-west terminal markets were moderate and somewhat below the numbers offered for sale during the comparable period in 1963. Rains over some areas tended to improve pasture conditions and encourage ranchers to delay feeder marketings. Partly offsetting the increase in feeder cattle prices were lower prices paid for baby chicks and turkey poults.

MOTOR SUPPLIES: The average of prices paid by farmers for motor supplies in mid-August was 1 percent below July 15 as a result of lower prices for gasoline and diesel fuel. At the same time, moderate increases were reported in prices of motor oil and tires. Mid-August prices of motor supplies averaged the same as a year earlier.

BUILDING AND FENCING MATERIALS: Farmers were paying higher prices for building and fencing materials in mid-August than a month earlier. Lumber, paint, and metal product prices were generally up and more than offset minor decreases reported for composition roofing, concrete blocks, and cement. Mid-August prices remained about 1 percent lower than a year earlier.

Rural Consumer Index Unchanged

Increases in prices paid for clothing and shelter were nearly offset by lower motor supply prices to leave the family living index at 300 on August 15. This was the 5th consecutive month in which the family living index has remained record high. It was nearly 1 percent above the August 1963 index. Primarily responsible for this increase from a year earlier were higher prices for used autos, food, and clothing. Prices were lower than a year earlier for household furnishings and building materials.

CLOTHING: Price increases for most wearing apparel, particularly items made of cotton, raised the average of prices paid by farmers for clothing slightly during the month ended August 15. The advances were most marked for women's clothing. Clothing prices averaged 1 percent higher than a year earlier.

Support Price Announcements for Agricultural Products
(July 29-August 28, 1964)

Rice--1964 crop: The final national average support price for 1964-crop rice will be \$4.71 per hundredweight, the same as for the preceding 3 crops and the same as the advance support announced last December. The 1964 crop support reflects 74.4 percent of the August 1964 parity price for rice. USDA 2710-64, issued 8/12/64

Wheat--1965 crop: Participating wheat producers will be eligible for price-support loans at a national average rate of \$1.25 per bushel (5 cents per bushel less than for 1964-crop wheat) on their entire 1965-crop wheat production. As under the 1964 Wheat Program, they will receive, in addition, certificates based on the normal production of eligible acres planted. Domestic certificates will be worth 75 cents per bushel, up 5 cents per bushel from 1964 and will apply to 45 percent of normal production. Export certificates will be valued at 30 cents a bushel (also up 5 cents) but will apply to 35 percent of normal production compared with 45 percent in 1964.
