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PRICES RECEIVED INDEX DOWN 3 POINTS PARITY INDEX UNCHANGED PARITY RATIO 74

The Index of Prices Received by Farmers declined 3 points (1 percent) during the month ended June 15 to 232 percent of its 1910-14 average, the Crop Reporting Board announced today. Lower prices for wheat (associated with changes in the support program) contributed most to the decline. Prices of oranges, grapefruit, wholesale milk, and calves were also down. Offsetting in part were price increases for potatoes and hogs. The index was 4 percent below June 1963 and the lowest for the month since 1946.

The Index of Prices Paid for Commodities and Services including Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates remained at 313 during the month ended June 15. It was 1 point under the high established in April. Prices paid for production goods declined slightly from May to June, but other components were unchanged. The June index was about one-third of 1 percent higher than a year earlier.

With the decline in farm product prices, the Parity Ratio dropped 1 point to 74 on June 15, down 4 percent from a year earlier, and the lowest since August 1939.

PRICES RECEIVED BY FARMERS

FOOD GRAINS: Sharply lower wheat prices during the month ended June 15 dropped the food grains index 22 percent to 170 (1910-14=100), the lowest for any month since September 1945. The index was 21 percent below June 1963. The average price of wheat dropped to \$1.40 per bushel in mid-June, off 48 cents from May and 46 cents below a year earlier. The decline reflects changes in the wheat program involving a reduced price-support loan rate and the use of marketing certificates. Mid-month prices received for wheat and other grains reflect open market sales and do not include the value of marketing certificates or payments-in-kind received by growers. Rye averaged \$1.19 per bushel in mid-June, up 27½ cents from a month earlier, while rice averaged \$5.10 per cwt., 13 cents below the mid-May level.

POTATOES, SWEETPOTATOES, AND DRY EDIBLE BEANS: A 34 percent increase in potato prices lifted the index 28 percent to 322 in June, the highest for the month since 1956. Small supplies of storage potatoes, together with less than the usual increase in new-crop volume, resulted in a \$1.01 increase during June to \$3.98 per cwt., over 2½ times a year earlier and the highest for the month since 1956. Sweetpotato prices advanced 26 percent, while dry beans declined slightly. The index was more than twice as high as June 1963.

FRUIT: The fruit index declined 8 percent during the month to 301, as lower prices for oranges and grapefruit more than offset relatively high prices for new-crop peaches. Orange prices, at \$3.89 per box, equivalent packinghouse door returns, were 86 cents below a month earlier, and grapefruit prices declined 98 cents per box to \$2.30, equivalent p.h.d. returns. Prices received for fresh peaches, at \$4.82 per bushel, were \$2.01 above June 1963, reflecting the short 1964 crop in southeastern States. The index was 6 percent below a year earlier as a result of lower citrus prices.

DAIRY PRODUCTS: A larger than seasonal decline in wholesale milk prices during the month resulted in a 1 percent decline in the dairy products index to 234. Farmers received an average of \$3.77 per cwt. for all milk sold wholesale during June, down 5 cents from May. Fluid market milk during June averaged \$4.14 per cwt. while manufacturing grade milk averaged \$3.13 per cwt., down 4 cents and 2 cents, respectively, from a month earlier.

POULTRY AND EGGS: Higher egg prices were mainly responsible for a 2 percent increase in the poultry and egg index to 133. Commercial broilers also were higher. Egg prices advanced 2 percent during the month to 30.5 cents per dozen, compared with the usual May-June decline of 2 percent. Commercial broilers averaged 13.7 cents per pound, up 1 percent from May. Partly offsetting were 2 percent declines in farm chicken and turkey prices. The index was 1 percent below a year earlier.

MEAT ANIMALS: The meat animal index rose 1 point from mid-May to 264 as increases of 60 cents per cwt. for hogs and 20 cents for lambs more than offset declines of 10 cents for beef cattle, \$1.30 for calves, and 17 cents for sheep. At \$14.90, mid-month prices of hogs averaged the highest so far in 1964, but were below last June. Mid-month prices of lambs in June were the highest for any month since June 1959. Calves, at \$19.90 per cwt., were the lowest since November 1957. Receipts of cattle at 12 public stockyards for the 4 weeks ended June 20 were up 3 percent from the 4 weeks ended May 16 and were 14 percent above a year earlier. Receipts of hogs at these yards, together with interior Iowa and southern Minnesota points, were down 14 percent from the 4 weeks ended May 16 and were 4 percent below a year earlier.

PRICES PAID BY FARMERS

On June 15, the index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services was 282 percent of its 1910-14 average, the same as a month earlier. The index of prices paid for items used in farm production declined slightly during the month, but the index of rural consumer prices remained at the previously established second-quarter high. Prices of living and production goods combined averaged 2/5 of 1 percent below a year ago.

Production Goods Index Down

During the month ended June 15, the index of prices paid by farmers for production goods declined 2/5 of 1 percent. At 269, it was 1 percent below a year earlier. Contributing to the May-June decline were lower prices for livestock and poultry feed, feeder and replacement livestock, and used autos. Partly offsetting were higher prices paid for farm machinery, farm supplies, and building and fencing materials.

FEEDER LIVESTOCK: Lower prices paid by farmers for feeder cattle and baby chicks dropped the mid-June feeder livestock index to 298. This was 4 percent under a month earlier, 14 percent below June 1963, and the lowest June index since 1956. In early June, feeder cattle and calf prices recovered some of the losses of late May, but, as of mid-June, had not regained the mid-May level. Baby chick prices dropped 13 percent during the month with a seasonal increase in the proportion of broiler chicks in the total hatch.

FEED: Prices paid by farmers for most feed items continued to decline during the month ended June 15, dropping the index to 203. This was about 1 percent under both a month and a year earlier. Prices paid for alfalfa and other hay were respectively \$1.50 and \$1.90 per ton below mid-May. Moderate declines were reported for poultry, dairy, and hog feed, beef cattle supplement, and oilseed meals. Increases were reported for oats, barley, grain sorghum, and corn meal.

FARM MACHINERY: Prices paid by farmers for farm machinery in mid-June averaged 3 percent above the same date last year. Prices for all groups of implements increased with harvesting machinery, principally combines, showing the greatest gain. Prices of haying machinery also rose with moderate gains recorded for cultivators, wagons, and dairy equipment.

Rural Consumer Index Unchanged

Increases in food prices during the month ended June 15 offset lower prices for clothing, household supplies, and used cars to leave the June index of prices paid by farmers for consumer goods at 300. This is the third successive month that the index has held at the peak level first established in April. In mid-June it was 1 percent higher than a year earlier.

FOOD AND TOBACCO: Higher potato prices lifted the average of prices paid for food and tobacco nearly 1 percent during the month ended June 15. Retail potato prices rose 30 percent during the month. Prices paid for steak, beverages, and bakery products also advanced. These advances were offset in part, however, by price declines for sugar, subtropical fruit, and salad dressing. Prices paid by farmers for food and tobacco items as of June 15 averaged 1 percent higher than on June 15, 1963, the previous high for the month.

Spring Seed Prices Average Same as Year Earlier

Prices paid by the Nation's farmers for field seeds purchased during the 1964 spring planting season--February thru May--averaged about the same as a year earlier the Crop Reporting Board reported today. The seed price index for May was 231 percent of its 1910-14 base. This was the same as the average from February through May in both 1964 and 1963. Higher prices than in 1963 were reported for seed potatoes, all seed grains, and grass seeds, but these increases were offset by lower prices for legume seeds and cottonseed.

Seed potato prices were up 15 percent in 1964, reflecting higher prices for "table stock" at planting time. At the start of the season, seed potatoes averaged about 9 percent above a year earlier, but prices began to climb in April and averaged 30 percent higher in May.

All important seed grains were priced at a higher level last spring than in 1963. The advance was led by wheat which increased 8 percent. Corn, soybeans, and oats were up somewhat less. A 19 percent drop in the price of certified alfalfa was the primary decline in the field seed group in 1964. Substantial declines were also recorded for common alfalfa, sweet clover, and ladino clover seed. In addition, cottonseed averaged 8 percent lower in the spring of 1964. Korean Lespedeza, the only legume seed of importance which was higher in price, advanced 17 percent reflecting reduced supplies.

UNITED STATES PRICE

The season average price for the United States is computed by weighting State prices by quantities sold.

DEFINITION OF TERMS

In the following tables price data, unless otherwise noted, are the average prices farmers receive for their products on a local market basis at the point of first sale, commonly referred to as the "average price as sold." For example, if in a given State, half of the fruit is sold f.o.b. packed by growers, one-fourth sold as bulk fruit at the packinghouse door, and one-fourth sold retail or at roadside stands, then the "average price as sold" is a weighted average of the prices applicable to the three positions.

For most fruits in the Pacific Coast States prices are expressed as "equivalent returns" which is the common basis upon which settlement is made with the grower in the area. The equivalent packinghouse-door returns represent actual prices adjusted to apply to returns at the packinghouse door. That is, the f.o.b. packed price is adjusted to the incoming packinghouse door by subtracting all costs that accumulate between the incoming packinghouse door and the f.o.b. local shipping point such as grading, packing, packing material, inspection fees, selling, and other costs. Equivalent on-tree returns are derived by subtracting costs of picking and hauling fruit to the packing house from the equivalent packinghouse-door returns. This estimate is made by the Crop Reporting Board for certain fruits in certain areas primarily to meet the needs of the Department in administering marketing agreements under the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937 as amended.

UNITS

Apples and Cranberries: The prices and equivalent returns per bushel for apples are on the basis of the full bushel equivalent net weight of 48 pounds. Cranberry estimates reflect equivalent returns at the first receiving station.

UNPUBLISHED PROCESSING PRICES

For some States in certain years quantities for one processing category may not be published or may be combined with another processing item to avoid disclosing individual operations--see Production, Use, and Value bulletin to be published July 1, 1964. In such cases prices are not published for the item. However, when two or more processing groups are combined, the price may be published for one of the items if this would not disclose individual operations.
