PRICES RECEIVED, PARITY INDEX, AND PARITY RATIO UNCHANGED

During the month ended November 15, the Index of Prices Received by Farmers remained unchanged at 248 percent of its 1910-14 average, the Crop Reporting Board announced today. The most important changes were lower prices for oranges, corn, and cattle, and price increases for tomatoes, hogs, and eggs. The index was 6 percent higher than November 1964.

The Index of Prices Paid for Commodities and Services, including Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates, was unchanged from the previous month. The index, at 322, was 3 percent above a year earlier.

With farm product prices and prices paid by farmers averaging unchanged, the Parity Ratio remained at 77. This was 2 points above a year earlier.

PRICES RECEIVED BY FARMERS

FRUIT: Seasonally lower prices for oranges and grapefruit during November resulted in an 11 percent decline in the fruit index to 215 percent of its 1910-14 average. Oranges, at \$1.89 per box, equivalent packinghouse door returns, were 95 cents lower than the average for October, while grapefruit, at \$1.69 per box, equivalent phd, were 30 cents lower. Average prices for lemons, pears, and apples also declined. Strawberry prices increased seasonally from a month earlier. The index was 23 percent below November 1964, mainly as a result of lower citrus prices.

COMMERCIAL VEGETABLES: The commercial vegetable index advanced 9 percent during the month to 258, as seasonally higher prices were reported for tomatoes, celery, sweet corn, and snap beans. Partially offsetting were lower prices for lettuce, onions, cauliflower, cucumbers, and spinach. The index was 8 percent below November 1964.

FEED GRAINS AND HAY: Corn prices declined 8 cents during the month, reflecting the adjustment to a new-crop basis, and were responsible for lowering the index 3 percent to 156. All other feed grains and hay were above a month earlier. Oats and barley were up 0.6 cent and 3.1 cents per bushel, respectively, sorghum grain was 1 cent per cwt. higher, and hay advanced 40 cents per ton. The index was 3 percent below November 1964.

POULTRY AND EGGS: Moderately higher prices for eggs, chickens, and turkeys lifted the poultry and egg index 3 percent during the month to 154. Eggs, at 37.7 cents per dozen in mid-November, were 2 percent above a month earlier, compared with the usual October-November advance of 1 percent. Chicken and turkey prices increased 3 percent from mid-October. The November index was 8 percent higher than a year earlier, mostly because of higher egg prices.

FOOD GRAINS: The food grains index rose 2 percent during the month to 167. Wheat prices were up 3 cents per bushel and rice increased 1 cent per cwt., while rye was unchanged. Compared with November 1964, the index was down 1 1/2 percent as prices for each of the food grains were lower.

DAIRY PRODUCTS: Seasonal gains in prices received by farmers for wholesale milk raised the dairy products index 1/2 percent from October to 279. Fluid market milk sold wholesale by farmers to plants and dealers averaged \$5.00 per cwt. during November. This was 4 cents above the revised average price for October and 6 cents above a year earlier. Manufacturing grade milk averaged \$3.58 per cwt., up 5 cents from a month earlier and 8 cents above November 1964. The index was 1 1/2 percent higher than in November last year.

COTTON: Average prices received by farmers for upland cotton declined 1 1/2 percent during the month to 29.02 cents per pound. This was about the usual October-November decrease, and reflected sales of lower quality cotton from late harvestings in Southeastern and South Central States. Upland cotton prices in mid-November averaged 4 percent below a year earlier.

PRICES PAID BY FARMERS

The Index of Prices Paid by Farmers, at 289 percent of the 1910-14 base in mid-November, was up 1/3 percent from a month earlier. Prices of family living items averaged slightly higher, while prices of production goods averaged unchanged. The index was 2 percent above a year earlier.

RURAL CONSUMER INDEX HIGHER

The rural family living index advanced 2/3 percent during the month ended November 15 to 307 percent of the 1910-14 base. Higher prices paid for clothing, food, household furnishings, autos and auto supplies, and house building materials were responsible. Items used in operation of the farm household averaged unchanged. Compared with a year earlier, family living items averaged 2 percent higher.

CLOTHING: Prices paid by farmers for wearing apparel increased 1 percent during the month ended November 15. Price advances were reported for most types of clothing. Cotton goods, woolens, artificial fibers, footwear, and leather goods were higher. Clothing prices were 3 percent higher than a year earlier.

FOOD AND TOBACCO: Food and tobacco prices paid by farmers increased 1/2 percent during the month ended November 15. Higher prices for pork sausage, pink salmon, eggs, bread, navy beans, fresh tomatoes, and cola drinks were partially offset by lower prices for bacon, bananas, oranges, and coffee. Compared with a year earlier, food prices were 3 percent higher.

AUTOS AND AUTO SUPPLIES: Higher prices paid by farmers for autos and auto supplies raised the index 1 percent during the month ended November 15 to 330. Mainly responsible were higher prices paid for used autos. The index was 1/2 percent above a year earlier.

PRODUCTION GOODS INDEX UNCHANGED

The index of prices paid by farmers for production goods remained unchanged from a month earlier at 276. Prices averaged lower for feed, feeder livestock, and building and fencing materials. Increases were reported for motor vehicles, while farm supplies and motor supplies remained unchanged. Prices averaged 3 percent above a year earlier.

MOTOR VEHICLES: The index of prices paid by farmers for motor vehicles increased 1 1/2 percent to 464 during the month ended November 15, reflecting higher prices paid for used autos and trucks. New cars and trucks averaged slightly lower. The mid-November index was 2 percent above a year earlier.

FEED: The index of prices paid for feed declined 1 percent from the previous month to 203. Lower prices for feed grains and most mixed feeds accounted for the decrease. Higher prices paid for hay, soybean meal, and cottonseed meal were partially offsetting. The index was 1/2 percent above a year earlier.

BUILDING AND FENCING MATERIALS: Prices paid by farmers for building and fencing materials averaged slightly lower than a month earlier. Compared with November 1964 building and fencing material prices were 1/2 percent higher.

FARMS USE MORE ELECTRICITY

An average of 716 kilowatt hours of electricity per farm was used in the United States (excluding Alaska and Hawaii) during June 1965, according to an annual utility survey. This was an increase of 2 percent from a year earlier. In the five previous years the average number of kilowatt hours used per farm during June was: 1960, 617 KWH; 1961, 645 KWH; 1962, 665 KWH; 1963, 687 KWH; and 1964, 700 KWH.

In June 1965, farmers paid an average of 2.27 cents per kilowatt hour for electricity, down slightly from a year earlier when cost per kilowatt hour averaged 2.31 cents.

The average farm electric bill increased in all regions in June 1965 compared with a year earlier except in the South Atlantic and East South Central States where it declined 10 cents. The average monthly electric bill paid by farmers and the average cost per kilowatt hour in June 1965, by regions, were as follows: New England, \$19.50, 2.68 cents per KWH; Middle Atlantic, \$18.60, 2.18 cents per KWH; East North Central, \$15.80, 2.43 cents per KWH; West North Central, \$16.50, 2.78 cents per KWH; South Atlantic, \$12.50, 2.14 cents per KWH; East South Central, \$10.20, 1.76 cents per KWH; West South Central, \$11.90, 2.87 cents per KWH; Mountain, \$22.40, 2.17 cents per KWH; and Pacific, \$46.60, 1.86 cents per KWH.

MORE FARMS USE LP GAS

About 48 percent of the farms in the United States (excluding Alaska and Hawaii) were using liquefied petroleum gas during the summer of 1965, the Crop Reporting Board announced today. Estimates, based on returns to an annual survey, showed that 1,627,000 farmers were using LP gas on their farms, an increase of 1 percent from the summer of 1964 to the summer of 1965.

The price per gallon (bulk purchases) and per pound (cylinder purchases) was down slightly from a year earlier. Farm purchases in 1965 averaged 12.4 cents per gallon and 7.71 cents per pound, compared with 12.7 cents per gallon and 7.90 cents per pound in 1964.

Wheat - 1966 crop: The national average price-support loan for 1966-crop wheat will be \$1.25 per bushel. Domestic certificates will be issued to eligible producers on 45 percent of the projected yield for the farm allotment valued at the difference between the national average loan rate of \$1.25 per bushel and parity as of the beginning of the marketing year July 1, 1966.

Wool and mohair - 1966 clip: The incentive price for shorn wool will be 65 cents a pound for the 1966 marketing year, 3 cents per pound more than in 1965. The price of pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the incentive price for shorn wool.

The support price for mohair will be 75.8 cents a pound, 3.8 cents a pound more than in the 1965 marketing year.

USDA 3755-65, issued 11/24/65

Upland cotton - 1966 crop: Price support loans will be available to eligible producers on 1966-crop upland cotton, based on a national average loan rate of 21 cents per pound for middling 1-inch cotton at average location. The price-support payment rate will be 9.42 cents per pound.

USDA 3470-65, issued 11/5/65

Gum naval stores: The support level for gum naval stores in 1966 is \$35.60 per standard barrel (435 pounds net) of WG grade of crude pine gum, processed basis, the same as a year earlier. This reflects about 78 percent of the estimated parity price, unprocessed basis, as of April 1, 1966, the beginning of the marketing year.

As under the past 5 programs, the price of crude pine gum is supported through loans on gum rosin. The 1966 loan rate per 100 pounds of WG grade rosin is \$9.87, compared with \$10.00 last year, mainly because of higher commercial prices for turpentine -- the other primary component of pine gum.
