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BASIS OF ESTIMATES

The accompanying estimates are based primarily upon the figures reported to the Federal Census enumerator in Census years. Monthly reports covering from 20,000 to 25,000 flocks and annual reports for about twice that number, furnished by the crop reporters of this Department, supply the basis for the annual estimates between Census years.

Commercial flocks are presumed to be included in the Census figures under the Census definition of a farm, and therefore to be included in these estimates. The estimates for the intervening years are based, however, mainly upon changes in the reported figures for farm flocks of less than 400 layers. Adequate information is not available for commercial flocks, and when changes in these are greater or less, or different in direction from those in farm flocks, the accuracy of the estimates is affected. This fault is not serious in most states, but might lessen the accuracy and hence the value of the reports for states in which commercial production is important.

Chickens on Hand. Numbers of chickens enumerated by the Census as on hand on April 1, 1930, were accepted, and adjusted to the date of January 1 by allowance for changes due to losses and disposals between January 1 and the date of enumeration, as determined by changes during that period in flocks belonging to crop reporters. Although the 1930 Census was accepted as complete for numbers of chickens on farms, a complete enumeration including all town flocks would probably have increased the totals from a few percent in the more strictly agricultural states to possibly 10 or 20 percent in some of the states where a large proportion of the population is in small towns. The Census of 1925 was accepted as a starting point also, but with some adjustments in different states to allow for apparent incompleteness. As no population census was taken in 1925, many town flocks were probably overlooked that might otherwise have been enumerated as farm flocks.

Chickens Raised. Estimates of chickens raised are also established upon a Census basis. The absolute figures submitted by enumerators for the year 1929 were accepted, on the assumption that farmers reporting in April when hatchings are in progress would be likely to have a reasonably clear idea of the numbers being raised in the current year and of relative numbers in the previous year, of the losses sustained, and hence of the approximate number raised. Due to omission of flocks recorded on town schedules, to failure to record some flocks, and to memory omissions for the flocks recorded, the basis used is probably somewhat low. The 1925 Census was probably considerably less complete for chickens raised, being taken as of January 1, at a time when most of the surplus chickens were gone, and numbers on hand were near the low point of the year. Under these circumstances, underestimates were to be expected from producers of the number of chickens raised in 1924; hence a plus allowance of about 10 percent was made, varying somewhat for the different states.

Chickens Consumed on Farms Where Produced. The farm consumption estimates are based mainly upon quarterly inquiries made of the crop correspondents during the years 1922-23 and 1928 concerning consumption in their own households during the previous month, upon study of farm consumption data collected by poultry extension farm surveys, and upon annual inquiries of crop reporters concerning the numbers of young and old chickens eaten on their own farms during the previous year.

Chickens Sold. Owing to memory omission the Census figures on sales are too low. They were adopted for 1929 for the Southern States east of the Mississippi River only, and are probably too low even there. In most of the Northern and Western States the Census figures of sold are entirely too small to care for local

uses off chicken farms and for reported shipments to market. Also, to accept them would leave an impossibly large supply for consumption on the farm where produced. The estimates on numbers sold are based to some extent upon the annual reports by crop correspondents concerning sales from their own flocks, but in the main they represent a residual figure derived from "supply - (mortality carryover farm consumption)", checked by such data as are available on movement to market, urban consumption, etc.

Egg Production. The Census enumerations for 1929 were accepted. They are probably low, because of the incompleteness of the farm Census, especially in certain states, as mentioned previously. But as the Census was taken as hens were approaching the peak of the laying season, it was assumed that there would be some compensating excesses in the estimates by producers of the annual production. For the Census year 1924, taken as of January 1, 1925, at the low point in the seasonal cycle of production, when many flocks were producing no eggs at all, it was reasonable to believe, and all available evidence indicated, that the reported annual production which in most cases would be simply an estimate, was seriously below the truth. The estimates of this office of production in 1924 were set in the neighborhood of 20 percent above the Census figures. When the Census figures for 1929 became available, they were found to be closely in line with the estimates for that year for the United States as a whole. Corrections were needed in relatively few states. Census figures for eggs sold and eaten on farms are accepted.

The estimate of 12 percent mortality of mature birds is based upon estimates made by crop correspondents checked by records for individual flocks in many states. It appears probable, from data recently available, that mortality of hens has increased during recent years. Another special inquiry is being made this spring which will afford a basis for any needed revisions of this item, which will be applied in connection with the general revisions for past years to be undertaken when the 1935 Census returns become available. No deductions are made for mortality of young chickens, it being assumed that the number of chickens reported to the United States Census, which furnished the basis for these estimates, is exclusive of young chickens that were lost.

Estimated prices of chickens on hand, raised and sold, were based primarily upon the prices reported by farmers to the Federal Census enumerators in 1920. Those of chickens on hand are modified from year to year in accord with the changes shown in the annual estimates of values received from crop reporters. The estimates for prices of chickens sold are based upon the average price per pound of chickens sold, multiplied by the average weight of chickens sold, as computed annually. The estimated state average price for chickens sold is also applied to chickens eaten on farms, to chickens raised, and to the net number of chickens produced. The average value per head of all chickens raised, if estimated as of the date of January 1, would be somewhat greater than this, actually, because of the greater value at that date of pullets retained for layers. This refinement may be later introduced into these price estimates in connection with other revisions that may be needed in connection with the annual estimates next year, after the new Census figures become available. Prices for eggs are the weighted averages of the monthly farm prices.

While these estimates as a whole indicate the direction and extent of changes within reasonable limits, the lack of adequate information concerning commercial flocks prevents them from attaining the degree of accuracy that is desirable if they are to fulfill their purpose as a guide to the poultry industry. This limitation is especially apparent and serious in the states and regions where commercial flocks are an important or controlling element in the industry.

POULTRY AND EGG ESTIMATES, 1925-1934

The estimated number of chickens on farms on January 1, 1935 was 411,581,000, this being a decrease of almost 10 percent below numbers on that date in 1934, of 11 percent below numbers in 1933, and of almost 13 percent below the high point of numbers in 1930; and is the smallest number of chickens on farms of record since 1923. This reduction in numbers of chickens has resulted from the unfavorable prices for poultry products, especially when compared with prices for feed, existing during the past two years, a situation intensified by the actual shortage of feed in the important central and western poultry producing areas resulting from the great drought of 1934.

The North Central States, which have almost half of all the chickens in the United States, showed at the beginning of 1935 a decrease below numbers a year earlier, of 13 percent, the West North Central showing 16 percent and the East North Central 9 percent. The Far Western States showed a decrease of 11 percent, and the South Central States of 8 percent, while numbers in the North Atlantic States decreased only 4 percent and in the South Atlantic States only 1 percent. In some of the Central States, which suffered most severely from drought, reductions during the past year ranged mostly from 15 to 25 percent.

The estimated number of chickens raised in 1934 was 592,185,000, this being 11 percent less than in 1933, 12 percent less than the record production in 1929 and the smallest number raised in any of the 10 years covered by this series of estimates. All sections of the country showed decreases in 1934 compared with 1933. The West North Central States show the greatest decrease, 16 percent and the East North Central 13 percent. Decreases were 10 percent in the North Atlantic Division, 7 percent in the South Central and the Far Western Divisions, and only 2 percent in the South Atlantic Division, compared with numbers raised in 1933. Decreases in individual States of the West North Central group ranged mostly from 10 percent to 20 percent, but reached 40 percent in South Dakota which in 1934 experienced the cumulative effect of four years of drought.

The net production of chickens in 1934 is estimated at 537,433,000, this being a decrease of 12 percent below the net production in 1933. This net production of chickens is obtained by deducting from the number of chickens raised, annual mortality of mature birds estimated at 12 percent. Chickens consumed on farms in 1934 are estimated at 209,626,000, being about 8 percent less than consumed in 1933 and 15 percent less than in 1927, but 1 percent more than the low record for consumption in 1931. The decrease in consumption was greatest, 12 percent, in the East North Central States, 10 percent in the West North Central and 8 percent in the North Atlantic. The decrease was 6 percent in the South Central, 5 percent in the Far Western and 2 percent in the South Atlantic States.

Chickens sold from farms in 1934 are estimated at 371,408,000, or about 4 percent fewer than the high record of sales in 1933. Sales in 1934 were the smallest since 1927. The decrease from the 1933 record was 7 percent in the North Atlantic, and 5 percent in the North Central and Southern States. An increase of 4 percent in sales was shown in the Far Western States.

Of the total sales of chickens in 1934, the North Central States accounted for almost 55 percent, the North Atlantic for 14 percent, the South Central for 13 percent, the Far Western for 10 percent, and the South Atlantic for 8 percent. Iowa led in sales of chickens in 1934, furnishing almost 34,000,000 birds, or 9 percent of the United States total. Illinois, Missouri, Kansas and Ohio follow in order, ranging from about 24,000,000 to 21,000,000 chickens sold.

Hens and pullets in farm flocks, at the beginning of the year, which were estimated to number 404,086,000 in 1934, showed only 369,929,000 in 1935, a decrease of about 9 percent. Numbers this year are 12 percent below numbers in 1930, which set the high record for number of laying birds. Of the United States total of laying birds on January 1, 1935, the North Central States possessed 50 percent, 28 percent being in the West North Central and 22 percent in the East North Central States. The South Central States had 19 percent, the North Atlantic 12 percent, the Far Western and the South Atlantic States each 10 percent.

The estimated production of eggs in the United States in 1934 is ~~estimated~~ at 31,006,000,000 (eggs, not dozens). This production is about 3 percent less than the production in 1933 and 10 percent less than in 1931, when estimated production reached the high record figure of 34,442,000,000 eggs.

The North Central States, with 51 percent of the layers at the beginning of 1934, produced 49 percent of the eggs, 28 percent coming from the States of this group west of the Mississippi River and 21 percent from east of it. The South Central States produced 16 percent, the North Atlantic States 14 percent, the Far Western 13 percent, and the South Atlantic 8 percent of the total 1934 production.

Eggs sold were equal to 71 percent of the total production. The rest were consumed on the farm where produced or used for hatching. Considered by Geographic Division, the North Central States sold 74 percent of their total production, the South Atlantic 60 percent, and the South Central only 48 percent. In the North Atlantic and Far Western States, where large commercial flocks account for a large proportion of the total production of eggs, 81 percent and 80 percent respectively, of the total production were sold.

Estimated sales of eggs in 1934 amount to 21,887,000,000. This was less than 1 percent below the sales of 1933, but it was 11 percent less than sales in 1931, the peak year, and was the smallest of record since 1926. The North Central States supplied 51 percent of all of the eggs sold, the North Atlantic 16 percent, the Far Western 15 percent, the South Central 11 percent, and the South Atlantic States 7 percent of the total sales.

Values

A sharp increase in values of poultry and eggs occurred in 1934, from the extremely low levels of 1933. Prices are ^{world} still low, compared with the years prior to the depression or even previous to the War and, owing to the present shortage of feed, they are relatively low in relation to feed prices.

Farm prices per head of chickens, on hand on January 1 rose to 54.3 cents in 1935 from 42.2 in 1934. Farm prices of chickens sold during 1934 were 42 compared with 35 cents in 1933. Farm prices of eggs for 1934 were 17 cents, against 13.8 cents in 1933. While present prices compare poorly from ^{the} viewpoint of the producer with the five-year average price for the years 1926-30 of about 90¢ for chickens on hand, 78 cents for chickens sold and 27 cents for eggs, the upward trend is encouraging. As a result of these price increases, the total values of poultry and eggs show material increases, even though numbers are fewer and production less.

The estimated total value of chickens on farms on January 1 was \$223,651,000 this year, compared with \$191,954,000 in 1934 when numbers were 10 percent less, and with \$208,284,000 in 1933. The greatest total value of record since 1925 for chickens on hand January 1 was \$436,272,000 in 1930.

A considerable difference in the value per head of chickens on hand exists in the different geographical divisions of the country due to differences in the type of chicken kept and to differences in their earning power resulting from variations in the climate and feed supply, and in the local market demand for poultry products. Compared with the United States average price of 54.3 cents for chickens on hand at the beginning of 1935, the North Atlantic States show an average of 85.1 cents, the Far Western States 60.5, the South Atlantic 58.3, the East North Central 57.2, the West North Central 44.2, and the South Central States 42.2 cents.

The estimated total value of chickens raised in the United States in 1934 was \$242,422,000 compared with \$224,459,000 for the 11 percent greater production of 1933. The maximum total value of chickens raised was shown in 1929, at \$524,383,000.

The estimated total value of chickens sold was \$156,572,000 in 1934 and \$136,016,000 in 1933. The 1934 figures are only a little less than those for 1932, but are only slightly over half of the 1929 values of chickens sold.

Chicken eggs produced in 1934 had an estimated total value of \$433,510,000 being 21 percent greater than in 1933 when production was 3 percent more, and 16 percent greater than in 1932 when production was 4 percent less. The present total value is very low, however, compared with the 5-year average ending with 1930, of about \$717,000,000.

The value of eggs sold in 1934 was estimated at \$309,967,000, an increase of 22 percent over that of 1933 and 17 percent over 1932, but only 54 percent of the estimated value of eggs sold in 1929.

The price of eggs sold in 1934 by geographic divisions was 23.8 cents in the North Atlantic States, 19.1 cents in the South Atlantic, 18.2 cents in the Far Western, 16.2 cents in the East North Central, 14.8 cents in the South Central, and 13.7 cents in the West North Central States compared with the United States average of 17 cents. These differing values are dependent partly upon the quality of the eggs, which includes particularly freshness, size, weight, color and uniformity, and partly upon marketing facilities and demand.
