The number of cattle and calves on feed for market in 13 major feeding States on April 1 was estimated at 4,392,000 head, according to the Crop Reporting Board. This was an increase of 4 percent from the 4,222,000 head on feed April 1,1956. There was also an increase of 4 percent from January 1,1956 to January 1,1957, in these same States. The April 1,1957 number of cattle and calves on feed in the 13 States was 15 percent below the number on January 1,1957 which is about the usual decline and compares with a 15 percent drop during the same period of 1956. Numbers placed on feed in these States during the 1957 January-March quarter. at 1,736,000 head were about the same as the 1,728,000 head placed in 1956. Fed cattle marketed from the 13 States during the first quarter this year at 2,516,000 head were 2 percent above the similar period for 1956. Cattle and calves on feed in Idaho, which are not included in the 13-States, totaled 100,000 head on April 1, 1957—down 15 percent from 1956.

Cattle and calves on feed in 9 of the Corn Belt States on April 1, 1957 totaled 3,661,000 head-6 percent larger than the 3,465,000 head for a year earlier. All of the Corn Belt States for which cattle on feed estimates are made showed increases over April 1, 1956, except Nebraska which was down 1 percent, and Kansas, down 17 percent. The fed cattle marketed and numbers placed on feed for the January-March quarter of 1957 in 9 of the Corn Belt States showed little change from the same period of 1956. Marketings at 1, 764,000 head were unchanged and placements at 1,371,000 head were up 2 percent. Shipments of stocker and feeder cattle into 9 of the Corn Belt States for the January through March quarter of 1957 were up 6 percent from the same period of 1956.

For the 5 important western feeding States, Texas, Idaho, Colorado, Arizona, and California, cattle numbers on feed April 1, 1957, at 831,000 head, were down 5 percent from the 875,000 head on feed April 1, 1956. This compares with a 1 percent increase from the preceding year shown by these same States on January 1, 1957. Colorado was the only one of the 5 Western States that showed an increase over 1956 in cattle on feed April 1, 1957. The current number in Colorado, at 222,000 head, was up 15 percent. California numbers at 297,000 head were unchanged from 1956, while Texas was down 26 percent, Idaho down 15 percent, and Arizona, down 18 percent. Fed cattle marketed from California feed lots during the January through March quarter of 1957 totaled 375,000 head, down 1 percent from the 379,000 head marketed in the same quarter of 1956. The number placed on feed in California during the first quarter of 1957, at 176,000 head, was down 6 percent from 1956. In Colorado, first quarter marketings for 1957, at 116,000 head, were down 11 percent from 1956, while placements for the same period of 1957, at 92,000 head, were up nearly 5 percent from a year earlier.

Data for the 13 States indicate that the numbers on feed over 3 months April 1, 1957 was 6 percent above 1956, while those on feed less than 3 months were about unchanged from 1956. Expressed as a percent of total numbers on feed, the number

on feed less than 3 months was 37 percent in 1957 compared with 39 percent in 1956. The number on feed 3 to 6 months was 57 percent of the total compared with 56 percent last year. The number on feed more than 6 months was 6 percent of the total compared with 5 percent in 1956.

The breakdown of numbers by weight groups indicates considerably more medium weight cattle on feed than in 1956. The number of cattle under 600 pounds was 920,000 head, up 2 percent from last year. Those weighing from 600-900 pounds at 2,160,000 head were up 9 percent from 1956. Cattle weighing over 900 pounds at 1,312,000 head were down 2 percent from last year. The percent of total cattle in each weight group for April 1, 1957 and April 1, 1956 were: under 600 pounds, 21 percent compared with 21 percent; 600-900 pounds 49 percent compared with 47 percent; over 900 pounds 30 percent compared with 32 percent.

Steers represented 62 percent of the total cattle on feed April 1, 1957 compared with 62 percent for 1956. Heifers were 21 percent this year and 20 percent last year while calves were 16 percent in 1957 and 17 percent in 1956. Cows and other cattle represented 1 percent both years.

Cattle feeders reported marketing intentions on April 1, 1957 indicate marketings of fed cattle will be at a slower rate than last year with 47 percent of the April 1 numbers this year expected to be marketed by July 1. In 1956, feeders intended to market 51 percent of April 1 numbers by July 1. Of the total numbers on feed April 1, 1957, reported intentions show 15 percent to be marketed in April compared with 19 percent in 1956; 15 percent in May compared with 18 percent in 1956; and 17 percent in June compared with 14 percent for June of 1956.
