The number of cattle and calves on feed for market in the United States on January 1, 1957 was 4 percent larger than the same date a year earlier, according to the Crop Reporting Board. Numbers were estimated at 6,099,000 on the first of the year compared with 5,880,000 on January 1, 1956 and the 1951-55 avarage of 5,280,000 head. In the North Central States, numbers were up 5 percent from a year earlier. The 13 Western States showed only a slight increase of 2,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed in the Corn Belt at 4,425,000 head on January 1 this year compare with 4,216,000 a year earlier. Feeding in the western Corn Belt States was up 4 percent and the eastern Corn Belt was up 6 percent from a year earlier. Feeding in Iowa, the leading State, was up 9 percent from January 1, 1956, while Illinois, the second ranking State, this year showed an 8 percent increase. Minnesota showed an increase of 10 percent, Nebraska was up 3 percent, and Ohio was up 11 percent. Indiana, Missouri, and South Dakota each had the same number on feed as a year earlier. Kansas and North Dakota each had a decrease of 11 percent from January last year.

Shipments of stocker and feeder cattle into 9 Corn Belt States (for which data are available) during the period October-December were 7 percent above the corresponding period a year earlier. Shipments to the same States during the July-December period were up 23 percent from a year earlier.

California, the leading feeding State in the West, showed an increase of 1 percent over a year earlier in the number of cattle and calves on feed. Colorado, the second leading Western tate, was up 5 percent. Oklahoma, Texas, Idaho, New Mexico and Oregon were the only States in the western feeding areas that had fewer cattle on feed this year than on January 1, 1956. Nevada had no change, but all other Western States had more on feed.

In the 13 States for which quarterly estimates of cattle on feed are made, the number on feed January 1, 1957, was 5 percent more than a year earlier. On October 1, 1956, the number was 3 percent more than the same date a year earlier. The relatively higher level of feeding on January 1 this year was the result of an increase in the number of placements and fewer marketings during the past quarter as compared with the corresponding period a year earlier. Placements of cattle on feed during the October-December period were up 2 percent from the corresponding period a year earlier, while marketings were down 2 percent.

Data for the 13 States reveal that the number on feed over 3 months was 10 percent above last year, and the number on feed less than 3 months was up 3 perent. As a percent of total cattle on feed January 1, the number on feed less than 3 months was 72 percent compared with 73 percent a year earlier. The number on feed 3-6 months was 24 percent of the total, compared with 23 percent last year. Those on feed more than 6 months were 4 percent of the total both years, Cont'd, page 3

Cattle weighing less than 600 pounds constituted 30 percent of the total number on feed, compared with 29 percent a year earlier, those weighing 600-900 pounds made up 44 percent of the total in both years. Cattle weighing over 900 pounds made up 26 percent of the total compared with 27 percent last year.

Steers on feed January 1 represented 55 percent of the total compared with 7 percent a year earlier. Heifers made up 21 percent of the total each year. Calves accounted for 23 percent this year and 21 percent a year earlier. Cows and other cattle comprised 1 percent of the total each year. Cattle feeders in these 13 States intend to market about 45 percent of the January 1 inventory by April 1, 1957. This compares with 50 percent reported a year earlier.
