WHILE THE BUREAU FEELS ASSURED OF THE COMPLETENESS AND ACCURACY OF THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF POULTRY REPORTED, IT CANNOT VOUCH FOR THE ACCURACY AND CLASSIFICATION OF THE VARIOUS SIZES OF CHICKENS. THERE ARE A NUMBER OF CONCERNS WHOSE HOLDINGS ARE EXTREMELY HEAVY, WHO FIND IT IMPRACTICAL BE TO MAKE SEGREGATION ON THEIR REPORTS, CONSEQUENTLY, THERE WILL BE FRYERS, CONTAINED IN THE FIGURES SHOWN FOR BROILERS, ROASTERS AND POSSIBLY MISCELLANEOUS POULTRY.

WASHINGTON, D.C., SEPTEMBER 12TH. - FEDERAL SURPLUS COMMODITIES CORPORATION REPORTS AND SURPLUS MARKETING ASSOCIATION REPORT THAT THEY HOLD 12,938,000 POUNDS OF LARD AND 12,952,000 POUNDS OF PORK IN COLD STORAGE WAREHOUSES OUTSIDE OF PROCESSORS PLANTS. THESE AMOUNTS ARE INCLUDED IN TOTAL STOCKS.

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COLD STORAGE REPORT

AS OF SEPTEMBER 1, 1941

Stocks of all major groups of perishable food commodities held in cold storage warehouses and meat-packing plants on September 1, 1941, with the exception of shell eggs, were in excess of those on hand on September 1, 1940, and the 5-year (1936-40) average, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.

Frozen fruit holdings on September 1, 1941, totaling approximately 211 million pounds, were 27 percent greater than those of September 1, 1940.

Frozen vegetable stocks were about $83\frac{1}{2}$ million pounds, about $6\frac{1}{2}$ percent above holdings of a year earlier.

Creamery butter holdings of 200,539,000 pounds were the largest September 1 stocks on record with the exception of 1938, exceeding those of a year earlier by 66 million pounds or 49 percent.

Stocks of all varieties of cheese on hand, totaling 185 million pounds, were 24 percent greater than a year ago.

Shell egg holdings showed a 15 percent decrease from September 1 a year ago, but frozen eggs were higher by 33 percent. The total case-equivalent of both shell and frozen eggs (11,676,000 cases) was nearly $2\frac{1}{2}$ percent above September 1, 1940.

Frozen poultry stocks, totaling more than 85 million pounds, were 3 million pounds heavier than those of September 1, 1940. Frozen and cured beef increased 32 millions; frozen and cured pork, $65\frac{1}{2}$ millions; all meats $102\frac{1}{2}$ millions; and lard $10\frac{1}{2}$ million pounds compared with a year earlier.

Compared with the 5-year (1936-40) average for September 1, frozen fruit holdings were up 57 percent; creamery butter advanced 33 percent; cheese was 41 percent higher; the total case-equivalent all eggs rose 7 percent; poultry increased nearly 30 percent; beef was up 59 percent; pork increased 27 percent; and lard stocks were 94 percent greater than the average.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

FROZEN FRUITS

Cold storage holdings of all varieties of frozen fruits on hand September 1, 1941, totaling 211,047,000 pounds, exceeded those of September 1, 1940, by 44,644,000 pounds and the 5-year (1936-40) average by 76,981,000. The increase during August 1941 was 10,779,000 pounds, which quantity compares with an increase of 15,438,000 pounds for August 1940 and the 5-year average of 6,500,000 pounds. Of the total reported, 52,154,000 pounds were unclassified as to variety.

FROZEN VEGETABLES

Stocks of frozen vegetables totaled 83,480,000 pounds. This quantity exceeded September 1, 1940, holdings by 5,102,000 pounds. The increase during August was 10,336,000 pounds. Asparagus showed a decrease, lima beans and snap beans increased appreciably, sweet corn stocks almost doubled during the month, green peas increased slightly, while spinach showed a downturn. The quantity unclassified totaled 7,396,000 pounds.

American cheese holdings on September 1, 1941, were 151,737,000 pounds -- the greatest reported at any time on record, exceeding September 1, 1940, stocks by 25,422,000 pounds, and the 1936-40 5-year average for September 1 by 40,897,000 pounds. Total stocks of all varieties of cheese were 184,624,000 pounds compared with 149,188,000 a year earlier and 131,115,000 pounds average. The Dairy Products Marketing Association was holding 5,291,264 pounds of the total cheese shown above on September 1.

Creamery butter stocks totaled 200,539,000 pounds, the increase during August being 22,046,000 pounds. September 1, 1940, butter stocks were only 134,266,000 and the September 1 (1936-40) average was 151,067,000 pounds. Included in September stocks are 1,533,000 pounds held by the Dairy Products Marketing Association and 782,032 pounds held by the Surplus Marketing Administration and Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation.

Egg stocks totaled 6,134,000 cases of shell and 193,972,000 pounds of frozen. The out-of-storage movement of shell eggs during August was 507,000 cases compared with 543,000 cases during August a year ago and 419,000 cases for the August 1936-40 average. Frozen egg stocks were 48,319,000 pounds greater than on September 1 last year and 58,878,000 pounds above average.

SMA and FSCC holdings were 618,590 cases of shell and 19,212,391 pounds of frozen eggs. These quantities are included in the total holdings for September 1, 1941.

Frozen poultry stocks on September 1 totaled 85,276,000 pounds or an increase of 4,070,000 pounds during the month of August. September 1 stocks were 3,098,000 pounds greater than a year earlier and 19,434,000 pounds above average for that date.

MEATS AND LARD

On September 1, 1941, stocks of all frozen and cured meats totaled 625,881,000 pounds, indicating a net reduction of 135,403,000 pounds during August. The reduction of meat stocks during the same period of 1940 was 147,895,000 pounds. The average reductions during August 1936-40, however, were only 78,720,000 pounds.

Frozen and cured beef stocks, totaling 67,477,000 pounds, on September 1, increased 1,769,000 pounds from a month earlier while these stocks usually decline during August. Beef holdings were 31,814,000 pounds greater than on September 1 last year and were 25,078,000 above the September 1 1936-40 average.

Frozen and cured pork stocks fell sharply during August but were considerably larger than on September 1 a year ago. Stocks on September 1 this year were reported to be 482,992,000 pounds, compared with 618,866,000 pounds a month earlier, 417,564,000 on September 1 last year, and 380,343,000 pounds for the September 1 1936-40 average.

Lard stocks declined more than usual during August, totaling 282,875,000 pounds on September 1 compared with 332,863,000 pounds on August 1. In addition to lard stocks there were 5,338,000 pounds of rendered pork fat on hand on September 1, 1941.

Included in the above figures are 12,952,000 pounds of cured pork and 12,938,000 pounds of lard held by Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation in cold storage plants outside of processors' hands.
