PROCESSED VEGETABLES UP 10 PERCENT

Processors of the 5 major vegetable crops expect to contract 1.48 million acres in 1989, up 10 percent from 1988 and 12 percent above 1987. Canning contracts cover 1.06 million acres, a gain of 9 percent from last year. Freezers expect to plant 419 thousand acres, up 13 percent.

Acreage intentions for each of the 5 major processing vegetable crops is up from last year led by an 18 percent jump in tomatoes. Green peas should be up 12 percent and cucumber for pickles up 11 percent. Processors intend to contract 7 percent more snap bean acreage and 5 percent more sweet corn. Plans for tomato production call for 9.58 million tons under contract, a jump of nearly one-third.

SNAP BEANS are planned for 236 thousand contracted acres, up 7 percent from last year. Canning intentions, at 166 thousand acres should rise 5 percent while freezing acreage will likely jump 11 percent. Processors intend acreage increases in most States; only Indiana and Wisconsin expect fewer acres planted to snap beans.

SWEET CORN intentions are for 480 thousand contracted acres, an increase of 5 percent from last year. Cannerys expect 294 thousand acres, up 1 percent while freezers are contracting for 186 thousand acres, a jump of 12 percent. Processors in Illinois, Maryland, Minnesota, and Pennsylvania look for downturns in acreage compared with last year. Most States, however, expect increases led by a 36 percent jump in Idaho and a 23 percent rise in Delaware.

PICKLE packers are contracting an 11 percent increase in cucumbers from last year to 109 thousand acres. Major States with increases are Florida, California, Indiana, Michigan, North Carolina, Oregon, South Carolina, and Texas. Three States indicate downturns: they are Colorado, Wisconsin, and New Jersey.

GREEN PEAS are being contracted on 329 thousand acres this year, up 12 percent from 1988. Cannery plan to take 165 thousand acres, an increase of 8 percent while freezers' intentions of 163 thousand acres are up 16 percent. All major States expect increases.

TOMATO processors look for a bumper crop this year with 9.58 million contracted tons expected. This is up 32 percent from last year dictated by a similar increase in California. Acreage intentions are for 323 thousand acres, an increase of 18 percent. California, the dominant producer, with 85 percent of the acreage, expects a 22 percent increase. Indiana, Michigan, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania are also up; while Ohio intentions are down slightly.
