Subscribe to all Cotton Market reports Spot quotations averaged 125 points lower than the previous week, according to the USDA, Agricultural Marketing Service's Cotton and Tobacco Program. Quotations for the base quality of cotton (color 41, leaf 4, staple 34, mike 35-36 and 43-49, strength 27.0-28.9, and uniformity 81.0-81.9) in the seven designated markets averaged 103.61 cents per pound for the week ending Thursday, December 9, 2021. The weekly average was down from 104.86 cents last week, but up from 68.29 cents reported the corresponding period a year ago. Daily average quotations ranged from a low of 101.63 cents Friday, December 3 to a high of 104.44 cents Monday, December 6. Spot transactions reported in the Daily Spot Cotton Quotations for the week ended December 9 totaled 61,645 bales. This compares to 39,353 reported last week and 98,938 spot transactions reported the corresponding week a year ago. Total spot transactions for the season were 451,231 bales compared to 630,082 bales the corresponding week a year ago. The ICE March settlement price ended the week at 106.59 cents, compared to 103.70 cents last week.

#### **Southeastern Markets Regional Summary**

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Spot cotton trading was moderate. Supplies and producer offerings were moderate. Demand was good. Average local spot prices were higher. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. The COVID-19 Pandemic continues to disrupt labor availability and logistics. Vaccine doses were being distributed.

Mostly cloudy conditions dominated the weather pattern across the lower Southeast with areas of dense morning fog observed. Daytime temperatures in the mid-70s dipped into the upper 50s as a cold front moved across the region during the week. Widespread rainfall was received across the region. Precipitation totals measured 1 to 2 inches throughout Alabama, the Florida Panhandle, and Georgia. The wet weather interrupted harvest activities and fieldwork. Backlogs of modules and round bales were accumulating on gin yards and ginning continued uninterrupted.

Sunny weather early in the period gave way to cloudy and overcast conditions later in the week as a cold front moved across the region. Daytime high temperatures in the upper 70s dipped into the 50s and

40s late in the week. Widespread thundershowers brought 1 to 2 inches of moisture to areas throughout the Carolinas. Fieldwork and harvest activities were delayed by the wet weather and dense early morning fog. Gins continued to process backlogs of modules and round bales.

#### **Textile Mill**

Domestic mill buyers inquired for a moderate volume of color 41, leaf 4, and staple 34 and longer for second quarter through fourth quarter 2022 delivery. Domestic mill buyers also made initial inquiries for 2022-crop cotton, color 41, leaf 4, and staple 34 and longer for fourth quarter 2022 delivery. No sales were reported. Yarn demand remained good and mills continued to operate at capacity as allowed by labor availability. Mills continued to produce personal protective equipment for frontline workers and consumers.

Demand through export channels was moderate. Agents throughout the Far East inquired for any discounted styles of cotton.

#### **Trading**

- A light volume of color 31 and 41, leaf mostly 2 and 3, staple 38 and 39, mike 35-49, strength 30-32, and uniformity 81-83 sold for around 450 points on ICE March futures, FOB car/truck (Rule 5, compression charges paid).
- A moderate volume of color 41, leaf mostly 3 and 4, staple 37-39, mike 37-49, strength 30-32, and uniformity 80-82 sold for around 250 points on ICE March futures, same terms as above.
- Even-running lots containing color 31, leaf 2 and 3, staple 37 and longer, mike 43-49, strength 30-32, and uniformity 80-82 sold for around 110 cents per pound, same terms as above.
- A moderate volume of color mostly 31 and 41, leaf mostly 3, staple 35, mike 43-49, strength 29-31, and uniformity 81-83 sold for around 225 points on ICE March futures, FOB car/truck, Georgia terms (Rule 5, compression charges paid, 30 days free storage).

#### **South Central Markets Regional Summary**

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#### **North Delta**

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies of available cotton were light. Demand was good. Average local spot prices were higher. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. No forward contracting was reported. The COVID-19 Pandemic continues to negatively impact the overall global economy and supply chains, particularly due to high freight costs, demand for deck space, and a shortage containers shipping and truck Vaccinations and booster shots for those previously inoculated are strongly recommended by national health experts to help mitigate the effects of the COVID-19 virus and its many variants.

A cold front brought heavy rain showers early in the week, and temperatures plummeted into the 20s in the wake of the stormy weather. High temperatures were in the 50s and 70s. Overnight lows were in the 20s to 50s. Rainstorms returned at the end of the period, along with heavy fog in many areas. Most areas received around 1 inch of precipitation. Field activities were rapidly winding down. Ginning continued to make good progress throughout the region. A few more gins throughout the region completed annual operations. Local experts report yields of 1,000 to 1,200 pounds. Producers were beginning to see grade reductions due to inclement weather during the harvest season. The final National Agricultural Statistics Service's Crop Progress report, released on November 29, indicated that harvesting was completed in Arkansas, and stood at 97 in Missouri and 93 percent in Tennessee, very near the five-year average in all areas.

#### **South Delta**

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies of available cotton were very light. Demand was good. Average local spot prices were higher. No forward contracting was reported. The COVID-19 Pandemic continues to negatively impact the overall global economy and supply chains, particularly due to high freight costs, strong demand for cargo space, and a shortage of shipping containers, dock workers, and truck drivers. Vaccinations and booster shots are strongly recommended by national health experts to help mitigate the effects of the COVID-19 virus and its many variants.

A cold front brought heavy rain showers early in the week, and temperatures dropped into the 40s as wet weather settled into the region. temperatures were in the 40s and 70s. Overnight lows were in the 40s to 60s. Rainstorms continued through the end of the period, accompanied by earlymorning fog. Most areas received around 2 inches of precipitation. Field activities were mostly complete. Ginning was rapidly winding down in Louisiana, although several gins could run until after the first of the year. A few more gins in Mississippi finished annual pressing operations; larger gins operated at a steady pace. Local experts report yields of 900 to 1,300 pounds. The final National Agricultural Statistics Service's Crop Progress report, released on November 29, indicated that harvesting was completed in Louisiana and had reached 96 percent in Mississippi, very near the five-year average.

• A light volume of 2020-crop cotton, color 41 and better, leaf mostly 4 and better, staple mostly 37 and longer, mike 38-52, strength 28-33, and uniformity 79-84, with 100 percent extraneous matter (plastic) sold for 25.00 cents per pound, FOB car/truck (Rule 5, compression charges paid).

#### South Delta

• A light volume of 2020-crop cotton, color 41 and better, leaf mostly 4 and better, staple mostly 37 and longer, mike 38-52, strength 28-33, and uniformity 79-84, with 100 percent extraneous matter (plastic) sold for 25.00 cents per pound, FOB car/truck (Rule 5, compression charges paid).

#### **Southwestern Markets Regional Summary**

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#### East Texas

Spot cotton trading was active. Supplies and producer offerings were moderate. Demand was good. Average local spot prices were higher. Producer interest in forward contracting was light. Trading of CCC-loan equities was active. Foreign mill inquiries were moderate. Interest was best from China, Taiwan, and Vietnam. The COVID-19 Pandemic continued to place pressure on shipping logistics and slowed global economic recovery.

A light amount of rainfall was received in the Upper Coast and in the Coastal Bend with daytime temperature highs in the low 60s to low 80s. Producers prepared fields for next season. Ginning neared the end with most finishing pressing services at the end of December, but some will press bales into January. In the Blackland Prairies, producers cultivated fields to control winter weeds and applied fertilizer. Ginning was winding down and about 20 days away from completion. Producers had begun to book planting seed and fertilizer for next year's crop.

In Kansas, harvesting advanced under mostly sunny conditions and many producers had finished. Harvesting was estimated at 88 percent completed, according to a news release issued by the National Agricultural Statistics Service on December 6. In Oklahoma, a hard freeze occurred that helped finish the crop. Harvesting advanced and neared the end.

#### West Texas

Spot cotton trading was active. Supplies and producer offerings were heavy. Demand was good. Average local spot prices were higher. Producer interest in forward contracting was light. Trading of CCC-loan equities was slow. Foreign mill inquiries were moderate. Interest was best from China, Taiwan, and Vietnam. The COVID-19 Pandemic continued to place pressure on commodity markets and shipping logistics. Global economic recovery was slow.

Droughty conditions expanded with daytime highs in the mid-40s to upper 80s, and overnight lows in the low 20s to upper 60s. Most fields had been harvested, but some areas in the Southern High Plains and in the Rolling Plains need a hard freeze to knock the leaves from the plants and discourage regrowth. Most gin yards were loaded with modules. Some gins added a second shift, if there were enough employees. A few gins in the Northern High Plains neared completion and expected to gin the last module in 10 to 14 days. Gins in the Rolling Plains were estimated at about 40 percent completed. Producers were concerned about the increasing costs associated with fertilizer and herbicide availability and began planning early for the next crop season. Meetings and trainings were attended in person and virtually.

- In Texas, lots containing a heavy volume of color 52 and better, leaf 2 to 5, staple 36 and longer, mike 28-36, strength 28-34, uniformity 78-82, and 75 percent extraneous matter sold for 95.00 to 104.50 cents per pound, FOB warehouse (compression charges not paid).
- In Kansas, lots containing a heavy volume of color 21 to 41, leaf 4 and better, staple 35 and longer, mike 37-52, strength 29-35, uniformity 79-83, and 25 percent extraneous matter sold for 99.00 to 101.75 cents, FOB car/truck (compression charges not paid).
- In Oklahoma, a heavy volume of mixed lots containing color 34 and better, leaf 4 and better, staple 34 and longer, mike 39-43, strength 28-31, uniformity 77-82, and 75 percent extraneous matter sold for 97.50 to 100.25 cents, same terms as above.
- A heavy volume of CCC-loan equities traded for 45.00 to 47.50 cents.

- Lots containing a heavy volume of color 31 and better, leaf 3 and better, staple 33 and longer, mike 26-48, strength 26-35, uniformity 75-81, and 25 percent extraneous matter sold for 96.50 to 98.50 cents, same terms as above.
- A light volume of CCC-loan equities traded for 47.75 cents.

#### **Western Markets Regional Summary**

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#### **Desert Southwest (DSW)**

Spot cotton trading was active. Supplies and producer offerings were moderate. Demand was moderate. Average local prices were lower. Producers delivered previously contracted cotton to merchant and cooperative marketing pools. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Foreign mill inquiries were moderate. The COVID-19 Pandemic continues with the addition of a new variant, Omicron. West Coast port congestion, disruption of domestic and international supply chains, labor shortages, and pent-up consumer demand remains.

Conditions were mostly sunny and mild with temperatures in the mid-to-high 70s across Arizona. Around one-quarter of an inch of rainfall was recorded late in the period. Harvesting was nearly completed. Ginning continued without interruption in the DSW.

#### San Joaquin Valley (SJV)

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies of 2021-crop cotton were light. Demand was good. Average local prices were lower. Producers delivered previously contracted cotton to merchant and cooperative marketing pools. Producers were discussing 2022-crop prospects. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Foreign mill inquiries were moderate. COVID-19 Pandemic continues with the addition of a new variant, Omicron. West Coast port bottlenecks, disruption of domestic and international supply chains, labor shortages, and pent-up consumer demand are on-going issues.

Foggy conditions were prevalent most of the

period, which kept temperatures in the high 40s to low 50s. Welcome rainfall was received late in the period. Precipitation amounts ranged from one-quarter of an inch to one-third of an inch. Ginning continued uninterrupted.

#### American Pima (AP)

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies of 2021-crop were moderate and producer offerings were light. Demand was very good. Average local prices were steady. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Producers were discussing 2022-crop prospects. Producers delivered previously contracted cotton to merchant and cooperative marketing pools. Foreign mill inquiries were good and for prompt shipment. Sources reported all 2020-crop cotton was sold, but some remained to be shipped to foreign mill destinations. Shipping logistics remained uncertain, and expenses increased almost daily. Shippers continued to manage split shipments, rolled bookings, and variable The COVID-19 Pandemic transportation costs. continues with an addition of a new variant, Omicron. West Coast port bottlenecks, disruption of domestic and international supply chains, labor shortages, and pent-up consumer demand are on-going issues.

Temperatures ranged in the 50s to 70s in the Far West. Foggy conditions were prevalent in the San Joaquin Valley of California for most of the week. Rainfall was welcomed late in the reporting period. Harvesting was virtually completed. Arizona gins made good progress. Several California gins completed operations during the period. The remaining gins will be finished by the end of the year, except for one.

#### **Desert Southwest**

- A moderate volume of color mostly 21, leaf 2 and 3, staple 37 and longer, mike 37-49, strength averaging 31.0, and uniformity averaging 80.5 was offered for sale. Bids of around even ICE March futures were rejected by sellers.
- Similar lots containing mike 50-52 were offered for sale. Bids of 350 points to 425 points off ICE March futures were rejected by sellers.

#### San Joaquin Valley

No trading activity was reported.

#### American Pima

• A light volume of color 2 and better, leaf 1, staple mostly 50, mike 35-49, strength averaging 49.9, and uniformity averaging 87.1 sold for around 294.00 cents per pound, uncompressed, FOB warehouse.

#### Supply & Demand

## The following information was excerpted from the World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates, released on December 9, 2021

The U.S. cotton 2021/22 supply and demand forecasts are largely unchanged this month, with only a slight increase in production. The U.S. production forecast is raised about 0.5 percent as higher yields in other regions offset lower yields for the Southwest. U.S. exports, mill use, and ending stocks are unchanged from their November forecasts. Upland cotton's projected season-average price is also unchanged from November, at 90 cents per pound, 36 percent above its year-earlier level.

Net sales of 382,600 RB for 2021/2022 were up 2 percent from the previous week and 83 percent from the prior 4-week average. Increases were primarily for China (147,700 RB), Turkey (96,100 RB), Vietnam (68,400 RB, including 200 RB switched from Japan), Pakistan (25,300 RB), and Thailand (11,700 RB). Net sales of 18,100 RB for 2022/2023 primarily for Pakistan (15,000 RB), were offset by reductions for China (1,200 RB). Exports of 114,800 RB were up 61 percent from the previous week and 37 percent from the prior 4-week average. The destinations were primarily to China (32,400 RB), Mexico (16,000 RB), Turkey (10,200 RB), Peru (7,900 RB), and Indonesia (7,700 RB). Net sales of Pima totaling 7,100 RB were up 10 percent from the previous week, but down 45 percent from the prior 4-week average. Increases were primarily for Vietnam (3,500 RB), Pakistan (1,300 RB), India (500 RB), China (400 RB, including decreases of 900 RB), and Thailand (400 RB). Total net sales of 900 RB for 2022/2023 were for Egypt. Exports of 8,700 RB were up noticeably from the previous week and up 41 percent from the prior 4-week average. The destinations were to India (3,600 RB), China (1,900 RB), Pakistan (1,500 RB), Egypt (1,300 RB), and Thailand (400 RB).

Exports for Own Account: For 2021/2022, the current exports for own account outstanding balance of 100 RB is for Vietnam

# USDA ANNOUNCES SPECIAL IMPORT QUOTA #8 FOR UPLAND COTTON December 9, 2021

The Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation announced a special import quota for upland cotton that permits importation of a quantity of upland cotton equal to one week's domestic mill use. The quota will be established on December 16, 2021, allowing importation of 9,434,076 kilograms (43,330 bales of 480- lbs) of upland cotton.

Quota number 8 will be established as of December 16, 2021 and will apply to upland cotton purchased not later than March 15, 2022 and entered into the U.S. not later than June 13, 2022. The quota is equivalent to one week's consumption of cotton by domestic mills at the seasonally-adjusted average rate for the period August 2021 through October 2021, the most recent three months for which data are available.

Future quotas, in addition to the quantity announced, will be established if price conditions warrant.
