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Subscribe to all Cotton Market reports Spot quotations averaged 94 points lower than the previous week, according to the USDA, Agricultural Marketing Service's Cotton and Tobacco Program. Quotations for the base quality of cotton (color 41, leaf 4, staple 34, mike 35-36 and 43-49, strength 27.0 - 28.9, and uniformity 81.0 - 81.9) in the seven designated markets averaged 63.23 cents per pound for the week ending Thursday, January 16, 2025. The weekly average was down from 64.17 cents last week and from 77.89 cents reported the corresponding period a year ago. Daily average quotations ranged from a high of 63.70 cents on Wednesday, January 15 to a low of 62.66 cents on Thursday, January 16. Spot transactions reported in the Daily Spot Cotton Quotations for the week ended January 16 totaled 55,511 bales. This compares to 64,464 reported last week and 62,421 bales reported the corresponding week a year ago. Total spot transactions for the season were 488,647 bales compared to 572,133 bales the corresponding week a year ago. The ICE March settlement price ended the week at 66.73 cents, compared to 68.50 cents last week.

Southeastern Markets Regional Summary

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Spot cotton trading was slow. Supplies and producer offerings were moderate. Demand was moderate. Average local spot prices were lower. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive.

Mostly sunny conditions dominated the weather pattern across the lower Southeast during the period. Seasonably cold daytime high temperatures were in the 40s and 50s. Nighttime lows were mostly in the 20s and 30s. Scattered showers brought moisture to areas throughout Alabama, the Florida Panhandle, and portions of eastern Georgia during the week. Precipitation totals measured one-half of an inch to around two inches of moisture. Fieldwork advanced in fields where soils were firm enough to support equipment. Ginning neared completion in Alabama and Florida; ginning continued in Georgia and gins remained on gin days. Producers, ginners, and industry members made plans to attend meetings scheduled for early 2025. Sunny conditions were observed across the upper Southeast during the period. Daytime high temperatures were mostly in the 40s and 50s. Nighttime lows were in the 20s. Light

scattered moisture was received in areas throughout the Carolinas and Virginia. Precipitation totals measured trace amounts to around one-half of an inch. Fieldwork advanced. Ginning neared completion as a few gins remained on gin days waiting for the last remaining modules to arrive on the gin yards. Producers, ginners, and industry members made plans to attend meetings scheduled for early 2025.

Textile Mill

Domestic mill buyers inquired for a moderate volume of color 41, leaf 4, and staple 36 for first through fourth quarter 2026 delivery. No sales were reported. Mill buyers maintained a cautious undertone as they balanced production schedules with yarn orders.

Demand through export channels was moderate. Agents for mills in Vietnam inquired for a moderate volume of color 31, leaf 3, and staple 37 for April through June shipment. Representatives for mills in Turkey purchased a moderate volume of color 42 and 51, leaf 4, and staple 36 for February shipment.

Trading

• A heavy volume of color mostly 31 and 41, leaf 3-5, staple 37 and 38, mike 37-52, strength 28-32, and uniformity 80-83 sold for around 200 points on ICE March futures, FOB car/truck (Rule 5, compression charges paid).

South Central Markets Regional Summary

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North Delta

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies of available cotton were light. Demand was very light. Average local spot prices were lower. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. No forward contracting was reported. Business was very slow.

Cold fronts moved through the region early in the period. Snow flurries accumulated trace amounts to two inches in the Mid-South. Cloudy skies gave way to plentiful sunshine melting the snow. Daytime high temperatures were in the low 30s to 50s. Overnight low temperatures were in the low 20s to 30s. Precipitation totals measured more than quarters of an inch of rainfall. All fieldwork was hampered due to inclement weather conditions. Freezing temperatures followed by snow are in the nearby forecast. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, soil moisture conditions improved in Arkansas and Tennessee. A few drought areas persisted in spots that did not receive moderate amounts of snowfall. Some local experts are predicting a modest decline in cotton production compared to last season. Producers waited for better prices to influence planting intentions. Pressing operations neared completion at some gins. Virtual and in-person meetings were being planned and attended.

South Delta

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. Supplies of available cotton was light. Demand was very light. Average local spot prices were lower. No forward contracting was reported. Business was slow.

Daytime high temperatures were in the 30s to 60s. Overnight low temperatures were in the 20s to 30s across the region. In Mississippi, a mix of sunshine and cloudy conditions prevailed throughout the reporting period. Snowfall was received in a few areas measuring trace amounts to two inches early in the period. In Louisiana, precipitation totals measured around two inches of beneficial rainfall. Pressing operations neared completion. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, soil moisture conditions improved in Louisiana and Mississippi. Mississippi, despite the moisture, abnormal to moderate drought persisted in some areas. Producers were discouraged about low commodity prices. Virtual and in-person meetings were being planned and attended.

Southwestern Markets Regional Summary

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East Texas-South Texas

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies and producer offerings were light. Demand was moderate. Average local spot prices were lower. Producer interest in forward contracting was light. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. Foreign mill inquiries were moderate. Interest was best from Pakistan, Turkey, and Vietnam.

In East Texas, mostly sunny conditions and partly cloudy skies were observed this week. Daytime high temperatures were in the mid-50s to the low 60s, with overnight temperatures in the low 30s to 40s. Accumulated rainfall totals ranged from trace amounts up to one inch of moisture in some locales, with chances for snow and ice possible in the coming week. Fieldwork continued and fertilizers were applied. Mostly sunny skies prevailed in South Texas. Beneficial rainfall was received in the Coastal Bend, Upper Coast, and Rio Grande Valley (RGV). Daytime high temperatures ranged from the low 50s to the upper 60s, with nighttime low temperatures in the upper 40s to low 50s. Recent rainfall encouraged producers and is helpful as pre-plant decisions are ongoing. Producers began ordering planting seed. Fieldwork remains active, and fertilizer applications were made in the Winter Garden and lower RGV regions. Industry meetings were planned and attended.

West Texas-Kansas-Oklahoma

Spot cotton trading was active. Supplies and producer offerings were heavy. Demand was good. Average local spot prices were lower. Producer interest in forward contracting was light. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. Foreign mill inquiries were moderate. Interest was best from Pakistan, Turkey, and Vietnam.

In Texas, mostly sunny and partly cloudy skies dominated the weather pattern with daytime high temperatures in the mid-30s to mid-60s. Overnight temperatures were in the teens to 30s. Snow melted from the previous cold fronts that left some fields soggy. Another Arctic blast is in the nearby forecast. More rainfall is needed ahead of planting the next crop. Fieldwork was light since most fields had been prepared for winter. Harvesting was virtually completed. Gins continued processing seed cotton that accumulated at the gin yards. Most ginning plants had completed the season. Producers compared input costs and seed varieties for the next season. The annual Beltwide Cotton Conference was held in New Orleans, Louisiana in addition to other regional meetings.

In Kansas, daytime temperatures were in the mid-30s to upper 40s, and overnight lows were in the teens to 20s. Snow accumulations melted, and ginning resumed. Hauling modules out of the fields restarted as the soils firmed. Producers ordered planting seed. In Oklahoma, daytime high temperatures were in the low 40s to low 60s. Overnight temperatures were in the 20s to 30s. Mostly sunny skies prevailed, and any snow left over from the previous period melted. Ginning advanced and some gins finalized operations for the 2024 crop. Industry members attended meetings and made plans for the next planting season.

East Texas-South Texas

• A lot containing a heavy volume of color 31 and better, leaf 3 and better, staple 37, mike averaging 42.7, strength averaging 31.8, and uniformity averaging 81.4 sold for around 69.50 cents per pound, FOB warehouse, (compression charges not paid).

West Texas, Kansas & Oklahoma

- In Texas, lots containing a heavy volume of color 31 and better, leaf 4 and better, staple 35-37, mike 35-42, strength 28-33, and uniformity 78-82 sold for 65.25 to 67.25 cents per pound, FOB car/truck (compression charges not paid).
- A heavy volume of mixed lots containing color 21-43, leaf 2-5, staple 32-35, mike 37-47, strength 26-30, and uniformity 78-80 sold for 60.00 to 60.50 cents, same terms as above.
- A heavy volume of lots containing mostly color 41 and 51, leaf 8, staple 35-39, mike 27-36, strength 28-32, uniformity 35-39, and 75 percent extraneous matter sold for 44.00 to 47.00 cents, same terms as above.
- In Kansas, lots containing a heavy volume of color 42 and better, leaf 2-5, staple 33-37, mike 30-46, strength 26-34, and uniformity 77-82 sold for 59.25 to 60.00 cents, same terms as above.
- Lots containing a light volume of color 42-54, leaf 3-8, staple 32-37, mike 31-46, strength 25-32, uniformity 79-81, and 75 percent extraneous matter sold for 47.25 to 50.00 cents, same terms as above.
- In Oklahoma, mixed lots containing a heavy volume of color 51 and better, leaf 8 and better, staple 33-34, mike 32-50, strength 25-33, and uniformity 77-81 traded for 59.75 to 61.50 cents, same terms as above.
- Lots containing a moderate volume of color 32-43, leaf 2-4, staple 31-33, mike 37-46, strength 25-29, and uniformity 76-80 sold for 53.75 to 55.25 cents, same terms as above.

Desert Southwest (DSW)

Spot cotton trading was slow. Supplies and producer offerings were light. Demand was light. Producer interest in forward contracting was light. Average local spot prices were lower. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Foreign mill inquiries were moderate.

In central Arizona, skies were clear and sunny. Temperatures were mild with daily highs in the 60s and 70s. Nighttime lows were in the 30s and 40s. No rain was recorded during the period. In Safford, clear sunny skies returned after a winter storm the previous week. Temperatures remained cool with daytime highs in the 50s and 60s. Nighttime lows dipped into the teens at the beginning of the period. In New Mexico and El Paso, TX, daily temperatures were in the 50s with nightly lows in the 30s and 40s. No rain was recorded. Throughout the DSW, ginning continued and producers made plans for spring planting. Producers are predicting they will plant less cotton acres next season, due to a water shortage from droughty conditions coupled with low prices.

San Joaquin Valley (SJV)

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies and demand were light. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Average local spot prices were lower. Foreign mill inquiries were light.

Sunny and clear skies were prevalent throughout the territory during the period. Temperatures were above average with daily highs in the upper 60s. Nighttime lows were in the low to mid-30s. No rainfall was recorded during the period. The statewide snow water equivalent was reported at 10.8 inches, which is 40 percent of the April 1 average and 84 percent of normal, according to the California Department of Water Resources on January 15. Ginning continued.

American Pima (AP)

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies were moderate. Demand was light. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Average local spot prices were steady. Foreign mill inquiries were light.

In the San Joaquin Valley, skies were clear and sunny with daily temperatures in the upper 60s. Nighttime lows were in the low to mid-30s. No rain was reported during the period. The California Department of Water Resources reported on January 15 that the statewide snowpack snow to water equivalent was at 10.8 inches, which is 40 percent of the April 1 average and 84 percent of normal. Ginning slowed as several roller gins finished for the season. Temperatures were mild in Central Arizona with daily highs in the 60 and 70s. In Safford, cooler temperatures prevailed, with daytime highs in the 50s and 60s. Nighttime lows were in the 30s and 40s. No rain was recorded during the period.





Net sales of Upland totaling 316,200 RB for 2024/2025 were up noticeably from the previous week and up 71 percent from the prior 4-week average. Increases primarily for Turkey (102,100 RB), Vietnam (79,400 RB, including 1,300 RB switched from South Korea and decreases of 500 RB), Pakistan (56,600 RB), Bangladesh (24,100 RB), and China (18,700 RB), were offset by reductions for Japan (1,100 RB). Total net sales of 1,300 RB for 2025/2026 were for Mexico. Exports of 224,800 RB--a marketing-year high--were up 17 percent from the previous week and 56 percent from the prior 4-week average. The destinations were primarily to Vietnam (84,000 RB), Pakistan (33,800 RB), China (25,000 RB), Turkey (17,700 RB), and Mexico (12,500 RB). Net sales of Pima totaling 2,900 RB for 2024/2025 were down 55 percent from the previous week, but up 5 percent from the prior 4-week average. Increases were reported for Peru (1,000 RB), India (800 RB), Pakistan (600 RB), Turkey (400 RB), and Guatemala (100 RB). Exports of 8,300 RB were unchanged from the previous week, but down 17 percent from the prior 4-week average. The destinations were primarily to India (5,900 RB), Peru (1,700 RB), Thailand (300 RB), and Turkey (200 RB).

Optional Origin Sales: For 2024/2025, the current outstanding balance of 8,800 RB, all Pakistan.

Exports for Own Account: For 2024/2025, exports for own account totaling 700 RB to China were applied to new or outstanding sales. The current exports for own account outstanding balance of 5,700 RB, all China.
