FARM EMPLOYMENT SEASONALLY LOWER WAGE RATES UNDER YEAR AGO

The number of persons at work on farms during the week of December 19-25, dropped to 6,277,000, the Crcp Reporting Board announced today. The decrease from a month earlier amounted to about 21 percent, the usual decline. The number of family workers dropped about a million while the number of hired workers was down nearly 650,000 or about 38 percent.

In comparison with a year ago, there were 2 percent fewer workers employed on farms in late December. There was a small increase in the number of hired workers which was more than offset by the decrease in the number of family workers.

The number of persons employed on farms continued its downward trend in 1954. The average for the year shows a decrease of 1.5 percent. The decline was mainly in family workers as the number of hired workers averaged about the same as for 1953.

Farm wage rates on about January 1 averaged a little lower than a year earlier for the country as a whole. The seasonally adjusted index at 521 was about 1 percent under the 525 of January 1, 1954. Individual types of wage rates were all less than a year earlier except the rates per day with board and room and per day with house which were unchanged. By regions, January 1 farm wage rates averaged less than a year earlier in the East and West North Central and the East and West South Central States and were about the same in the South Atlantic States. There were increases in the remaining regions.

Per month rates with house averaged \$152 for the country as a whole with a high of \$232 in the Pacific States. Per day rates without board or room averaged \$5.30. These rates were highest in the New England States at \$8.00 and lowest in the East South Central States at \$3.90, and the South Atlantic States at \$4.85. Hourly rates without board or room ranged from \$1.07 in the Pacific States to \$0.53 in the East South Central States and averaged \$0.88 for the entire country.

The seasonally adjusted index of farm wage rates on about January 1 was nearly 4 percent higher than the index for the previous quarter. During the past year farm wage rates dropped about 3 percent from January 1, 1954 to

April 1 and continued to decline at a rate of about a half percent per quarter for July 1 and October 1. The rise in the index from October to January 1 is probably due to the establishment of new rates for workers employed the year round. Workers of this type are generally more highly skilled and have been reported more difficult to obtain and retain.

Farm work during the survey week was near its seasonal low. Temperatures in the East and particularly the Southeast were below normal. In the area from the Mississippi River to the Rockies, temperatures were much above normal. There was very little rain or snow in any part of the country. Farmers in most parts of the country were doing little more than necessary chores. Some outdoor work was being done in the central part of the country where it was warmer than usual Field work was mostly confined to the southern edge of the country. Harvest of citrus and various vegetable crop operations were in progress. Cotton picking was still in progress in California and Arizona.

The number of persons at work on farms during the survey week dropped sharply from the previous month in all regions. Decreases were about as usual for the season except for a smaller than usual drop in the South Atlantic States and a larger than usual decline in the East South Central States. The decrease in the South Atlantic States was less than average for both family and hired workers. In addition, there were more farm workers, both family and hired, employed in this region than a year earlier. It is possible that fair weather, despite lower than usual temperatures, permitted more than the usual amount of outdoor work. In the East South Central States, the greater than usual drop in employment was mostly in hired workers. Earlier than usual completion of preparing tobacco for market may account for the decline.

There were fewer persons at work on farms in late December this year than a year earlier in all regions except the South Atlantic, previously mentioned. There were fewer family workers in all regions except the South Atlantic. However, for hired workers there were more persons at work than a year earlier in the West North Central, the West South Central and the Pacific States in addition to the South Atlantic States. These increases were more than enough to offset decreases in other regions and give a national total slightly above a year earlier.

DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Employment

Farm employment estimates of the Agricultural Marketing Service cover persons doing farm work on all farms. Mailed questionnaires are received every month from 15,000 to 20,000 farmers who report the number of persons working on their farms. The Census of Population and the Census of Agriculture provide bench mark data on employment. The survey week for the mailed questionnaire each month is the last complete calendar week in the month except when that week includes the last day of the month; in that case, the survey week is the next to the last full calendar week.

Employment concepts

All farm operators are counted as employed if they spend one hour or more during the survey week at farm work, chores, or in the transaction of farm business. Members of the operator's family or household doing unpaid farm work or chores, are counted if they put in 15 hours or more during the survey week. Operators plus unpaid members of their families or households who meet these criteria of employment are called family workers. All persons doing one or more hours of farm work or chores for pay during the survey week are counted as hired workers. Members of the operator's family doing farm work for cash wages are counted as hired workers. Croppers are considered family workers when working on their own crops, but hired workers when doing farm work for pay off their own tracts. If a person is employed both as a family worker and a hired worker during the week on the same farm, he is counted as a hired worker.

Comparability with other data

The data on farm employment published by the Agricultural Marketing Service differ from those on agricultural employment published by the Bureau of the Census in the Monthly Report On The Labor Force. The Agricultural Marketing Service collects information from the employer (the farmer) who reports the number of persons working on his farm during the week regardless of the other jobs held by those workers. The Census data, on the other hand, are obtained through interviews with approximately 25,000 farm and nonfarm households with the housewife or some other member of the household reporting on the labor force status of the household members. They relate only to persons 14 years of are and over, who are in the civilian population and not in institutions.

The difference between the Agricultural Marketing Service and the Census data is attributable mainly to the different treatment of three groups of workers. Children under 14 years of age who meet the criteria of employment are included in the Agricultural Marketing Service estimates, but not in the Census Bureau's. It is estimated that this number may reach a summer peak

as high as two million. Persons working on more than one farm during the survey week are counted only once by the Census Bureau, but they are counted by the Agricultural Marketing Service on each farm where they work and meet the minimum hour requirements. This group is also more numerous during the harvest season when the demand for farm labor is greatest. The additional count of workers attributable to this duplication is estimated at a minimum of a quarter of a million and may be considerably larger. The third group is composed of persons who work in both agricultural and nonagricultural employment, but work longer at the nonagricultural employment; they are classified by Census as working on nonagricultural employment, but by the Agricultural Marketing Service as working on a farm. This last group may range from one-half million to a million in different seasons of the year.

Other groups counted by the Agricultural Marketing Service but not by the Census Bureau are imported foreign workers and some migratory workers not living in private households. On the other hand, the Census Bureau includes in its estimates of agricultural employment certain classes of workers which the Agricultural Marketing Service does not include. Persons with "nonfarm" occupations who are working on farms, such as bookkeepers and typists, some persons in certain agricultural processing activities, and farm operators with no other job who did no farm work are considered as employed in agriculture by the Census Bureau, but are not included by the Agricultural Marketing Service in its estimates of agricultural employment.

Because the volume of agricultural employment is affected by changes both in season and in weather, the difference in the week of the month for which the data are collected may also make some difference. The Agricultural Marketing Service data relate to the last full calendar week ending at least one day before the end of the month while the Census Bureau information relates to the week containing the eighth of the month.

The Agricultural Marketing Service estimates farm employment from current reports made by a selected group of farmers adjusted to bench mark data. The Bureau of the Census bases its figures on a sample of dwelling units. Accordingly, the figures in both cases are subject to a sampling variation and may differ from the results of a complete census.

Wage rates

Wage rates are reported quarterly by the same sample of farm operators that reports employment. The farmer is asked to report average wage rates being paid "at this time" in his locality. The "at this time" on the average probably represents the second or third day before the end of the month.
