Number of Workers Down

There were 2.51 million people working on the Nation's farms and ranches during the week of January 10-16, 1993. This compares with 2.57 million people during the January 1992 survey week. Self-employed farm operators accounted for 1.42 million of the total, along with 313,000 unpaid workers, and 611,000 workers hired directly by farm operators. Agricultural service employees working on farms and ranches made up the remaining 157,000 workers.


Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$6.40 per hour during the January 1993 survey week. This rate was up 3 cents from a year earlier. Workers paid on an hourly basis earned \$5.99 per hour compared with \$5.97 in January 1992. Field workers received an average of \$6.02 per hour, up 3 cents from the January 1992 survey week. Livestock workers earned \$5.64 per hour compared with \$5.62 a year earlier.

Benefits, such as housing and meals, were provided to 45 percent of the hired workers during the survey week, compared to 44 percent in January 1992.


During the survey week of January 10-16,1993, heavy rains interrupted farm work in the Southwest and the Southeast. Snow hampered farm activities in the upper Midwest and New England. Below normal temperatures dominated much of the West and Great Plains while well-above normal temperatures occurred in the Southwest and East. Supplemental feeding of livestock increased in the Great Plains in response to the snow and cold weather. Row crop harvest advanced little, if any, in the Central and Northern Great Plains and the upper Midwest. Soybean harvest and tobacco seedbed preparation were hindered by wet conditions in the Southeast. Cotton harvest advanced across the South as weather permitted. Harvest was at a standstill in Oklahoma due to wet field conditions. Wet conditions slowed fruit and vegetable harvests in Arizona and California. In California's Fresno area, producers pumped water out of flooded orchards and vineyards. Elsewhere in California, standing water brought the citrus harvest to a virtual standstill, with the navel orange crop nearly inaccessible. Florida's citrus harvest was near peak levels.

U.S. Wage Rates by Method of Pay




U.S. Wage Rates by Type of Worker




Wage Rate of Field & L'stk Wkrs Combined By Type of Farm

Agricultural Services

Crew leaders and custom crews provided 157,000 workers for the Nation's farms and ranches during the week of January 10-16, 1993. Service workers in California numbered 50,000 compared with 30,000 during the January 1992 survey week. Florida's number of service workers was 22,000, compared to 13,000 last year.

The average wages received by agricultural service workers in California and Florida were \$6.27 and \$6.23 per hour, respectively. Comparable wages in January 1992 were \$5.75 in California and \$6.38 in Florida.

Reliability of Farm Labor Estimates

Survey Procedures: These data were collected by the National Agricultural
Statistics Service during the last two weeks of January
using sampling procedures to ensure every employer of agricultural workers had
a chance of being selected.

Two samples of farm operators are selected. First, NASS maintains a list of farms that hire farm workers. Farms on this list are classified by size and type. Those expected to employ large numbers of workers are selected with greater frequency than those hiring few or no workers. A second sample consists of segments of land scientifically selected from aerial photography. Each June, highly trained interviewers locate each selected land segment and identify every farm operating land within the sample segment's boundaries. The names of farms found in these area segments are matched against the list of farms; those not found on the list are included in the labor survey sample to represent all farms not on the NASS list. This methodology is known as multiple frame sampling, with an area sample used to measure the incompleteness of the list. Additionally, a list of agricultural service firms was sampled in California and Florida. The survey reference week was January 10-16, 1993.

Reliability: Two types of errors, sampling and nonsampling, are possible in an estimate based on a sample survey. Both types affect the "precision" of the estimates.

Sampling error occurs because a complete census is not taken. The sampling error measures the variation in estimates from the average of all possible samples. An estimate of 100 with a sampling error of 1 would mean that chances are 19 out of 20 that the estimates from all possible samples averaged together would be between 98 and 102; which is the survey estimate, plus or minus two times the sampling error. The sampling error expressed as a percent of the estimate is called the relative sampling error. The relative sampling error for number of all non-salaried workers at the U.S. level was 2.1 percent and 4.4 percent for all hired workers. The relative sampling error for number of hired workers generally ranged between 10 and 20 percent at the regional and published State level. The U.S. all hired farm worker wage rate had a relative sampling error of 1.2 percent. The relative sampling error was 1.1 percent for both hourly paid workers and for the combined field and livestock worker wage rate. Relative sampling errors for the all hired farm worker wage rate generally ranged between 2 and 6 percent at the regional and published State levels. Relative sampling error. for wage rates published by type of farm and economic class of farm ranged between 2 and 8 percent at the regional level.

Nonsampling errors can occur in complete censuses as well as in sample surveys. They are caused by the inability to obtain correct information from each operation sampled, differences in interpreting questions or definitions, and mistakes in coding or processing the data. Special efforts are taken at each step of the survey to minimize nonsampling errors.

Revision Policy: Farm labor information is subject to revision the next time the information is published or the year after the original publication date. The basis for revision must be supported by additional data that directly affect the level of the estimate. Worker numbers and wage rates for January and October of 1992 were subject to revision with this report. No revisions were made but previous data are reprinted in this report for your information.

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The next "Farm Labor" report will be released at 3:00 p.m. ET on May 18, 1993.

The May 18th report will have information for the survey week of April 11-17, 1993. The report will include the number of Total Workers, All Hired Workers, Average Hours Worked by Hired Workers, and the All Hired Worker Wage Rates for 16 States along with regional and U.S. level information. State level information will be available for Arizona, California, Florida, Hawaii, Michigan, Minnesota, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Texas, Virginia, Washington, and Wisconsin. The hourly method of pay wage rate and the wage rate for field and livestock workers will be available for the 16 States and at the regional and U.S. level. The number of self-employed and unpaid workers along with the corresponding average hours worked will be available for California, Florida, Hawaii, and at the regional and U.S. level. Wage rates by method of pay, type of worker, type of farm, and economic class of farm will also be available at the regional and U.S. level. The number of Agricultural Service Workers and the corresponding wage rates (including by method of pay and for field workers) will be published for Florida and California.

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
