FARM EMPLOYMENT UP SLIGHTLY

The number of neonle working on farms increased by approximately 140,000 persons from January 1 to February 1, the Agricultural Marketing Service reported today. This raised the total of family and hired workers to 8,781,000 persons or 73 percent of the 1910-14 average on the first of this month as compared with 74 percent a year earlier. This was the lowest February 1 total for the 15-year period covered by the monthly record.

Normally there is about a 3 percent rise in the number of people employed on forms during the month of January. This year, the increase was somewhat less than usual with subnormal temperatures continuing in the southeast on February 1 and snow hampering outdoor form activities in the northern half of the country. Some of the truck-crop acreage killed by the freeze during the latter part of January was being replanted in Florida and spring onts seeding had begun in Texas. Elsewhere, on February 1, form work was limited largely to chores and routine care of livestock.

The number of family workers (including farm operators) employed on February 1 was estimated at 7,088,000 or only 25,000 more than a month earlier. This was considerably less than the usual seasonal increase and about 27,000 under a year ago. Changes in the employment of family labor were small during January of this year with slight declines estimated for the South Atlantic, East Central, and Mountain Divisions and less than the usual seasonal increases occurring elsewhere.

The number of hired hands working on forms on the first of this month was estimated at 1,693,000 persons. This was an increase of 115,000 hired workers over the estimate for January 1, but 106,000 less persons than were working on farms for pay a year ago.
