FARM LABOR

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NUMBER OF HIRED WORKERS DOWN - WAGES HIGHER - FEWER HOURS

During the week of July 11-17, 1982, 4.4 million people were working on farms and ranches in the United States according to the Crop Reporting Board. Hired workers represented 42 percent (1.8 million) of the total while the farm operators and other unpaid workers who worked 15 hours or more accounted for the remaining 2.6 million workers. The total farm work force was down 5 percent from July 1980 when the last comparable Farm Labor Survey was conducted.

In July 1982, the number of workers hired directly by the farm operators was 1.54 million, 14 percent below July 1980. The number of self-employed and other unpaid workers on farms declined 7 percent from July 1980.

Wage rates for all hired farm workers was \$3.96 per hour, up 12 percent from July 1980. The wage rate for workers paid on an hourly basis was \$3.87, up \$.34 and \$.01 per hour since July 1980 and April 1981, respectively. The wage rates for the different categories of workers were; field \$3.80, livestock \$3.76, and piece-rate \$5.91.

With the work force declining, the self-employed farm operators worked more hours than they had in the past. During the July 11-17 week, the self-employed farm operator averaged 47.2 hours, 6.8 hours more than in July 1980. The other unpaid workers averaged 38.6 hours for the week, down 1.8 from July 1980. The hired workers on the farm averaged 35.3 hours for the week compared to 38.0 in July 1980.

PERQUISITES AND OTHER BENEFITS

Approximately 45 percent of the hired farm workers received some form of perquisite such as meals, housing or motor vehicle in addition to the cash wages in July 1982. About 15 percent of the hired workers were furnished a house in addition to the cash wages. Data from the 1981 Farm production Expenditure Survey showed that the value of perquisites represented 15 percent of the total farm and ranch labor expenditures.

FARM WORKERS AND WORKERS PER FARM

Most areas of the Nation experienced favorable crop development and harvesting weather during the week of July 11-17. However, wet fields in the Midwest and South Atlantic States limited the number of days that fieldwork could be performed.

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During the week of July 11-17, 475,000 farms and ranches reported hired workers. Of the workers hired directly by the farm operator, 39 percent were working on farms where 11 or more hired workers were employed. In comparison, farms employing one hired worker accounted for 13 percent of the direct hire work force. Data from the 1981 Farm Production Expenditure Survey showed that 1,027,000 farms in the Nation hired one or more workers sometime during the year.

SURVEY CHANGES

The 1982 Farm Labor Survey has many characteristics that are similar to those in the former Quarterly Farm Labor Surveys that were discontinued in May 1981. However, some conceptual changes were made to the survey that make the data more compatable with other labor statistic series. For instance, in the past the total number of family workers was obtained, which was about 2.2 percent less than the total non-salaried workers obtained in the 1982 Farm Labor Survey. The survey week remained as the week containing the 12th of the month. The major types of workers were retained (field, livestock and supervisors) but all other workers were collapsed into a single group. Individual State data are available for the 28 States that have the largest hired work force. Estimates are published for the 28 States, 6 regions and U.S.

SOURCE AND RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

The estimates of agricultural labor are based on a multiple frame probability survey. Two sampling frames were utilized—a list of agricultural producers and an area frame. The list of agricultural producers used by the Statistical Reporting Service (SRS) consists of employers of agricultural labor. A random sample is selected from the stratified list for the survey. Employers who were likely to have large numbers of workers were sampled more heavily than those with fewer workers.

The SRS area sampling frame has all land units in the Nation classified for sampling. A probability sample from the area frame would provide an unbiased estimate for aricultural workers on farms. However, this is a less efficient sampling frame because a large number of workers are hired by a small portion of the farm operators. Therefore, the area frame is used to estimate the imcompleteness in the list. Thereby, the multiple frame sampling approach utilizes the desirable attributes of both frames.

Estimates based on a sample differ somewhat from data that would have been obtained if a complete enumeration had been taken. These differences are the result of sample variability. In addition, survey estimates are subject to non-sampling errors. These errors are minimized through enumerator training, questionnaire design and testing, and comprehensive edit procedures.

Standard errors and relative standard errors are statistical measures of the variation that occurs by chance because of sampling rather than a census of the entire population. Standard errors and relative standard errors were computed from the sample data. Indications from the survey were within the range of one standard error below to one standard error above the true value (actual estimate) in two out of three cases. The survey estimates have standard errors of 106,000 for the number of self-employed and other unpaid workers and 96,000 for the hired workers at the U.S. level. Relative standard errors are 4.0 and 5.8 percent, respectively. Relative standard errors at the regional level for hired workers ranged from 7 to 13 percent. Wage rates in the 28 States where State estimates are published had relative errors in the 5 to 10 percent range. At the regional and U.S. levels, the relative errors were in the 2 to 4 percent range for wage rates.

AGRICULTURAL SERVICES

Crew leaders and custom crews provided 289,000 workers for the Nation's farms during the week of July 11-17. Vegetable and small grain harvest along with the crews for the rogueing of field crops and seed crop tending accounted for the change in the member of workers supplied to the farm work force by agricultural service firms. Wage rates received by the hired workers furnished by agricultural service firms in California and Florida were \$5.06 and \$4.97 per hour, respectively.
