Record Low Farm Work Force

The Nation's total farm labor force for the week of January 19-25 is estimated at 3,420,000 persons. This was 2 percent below the January survey week a year ago and the smallest total for a survey week in any month of record. The 2,801,000 farm operators and other unpaid family members was also 2 percent below a year ago. Hired workers are estimated at 619,000 persons, 3 percent less than the same period a year earlier.

Farm workers averaged 33.5 hours during the January survey week compared with 32.8 hours a month earlier. Farm operators averaged 34.3 hours while other unpaid family members worked 28.8 hours. Hired workers averaged 35.3 hours during the survey week.

Rain, Snow, Blizzard Conditions Restrict Farm Activities

Extremely cold weather and heavy snows covered much of the northern half of the Nation during the survey week. Record snow depths covered many areas, particularly in the Pacific Northwest. The southern coastal area of California experienced very heavy rainfall resulting in extensive flooding in low lying areas.

Harvest activities were limited to citrus and winter vegetable crops in southern growing areas. In the north, activity was restricted to care of livestock, general chores, and shoveling snow.

Citrus picking in California was limited almost entirely to grapefruit harvest in the desert areas. Other areas in California were generally too wet to permit entering groves with equipment. Orange picking in Florida continued active. Citrus harvest was active in Texas, but was restricted some in Arizona by rain.

Vegetable harvest was active in south Texas areas and increased in Florida under generally favorable weather. The rain brought California's vegetable harvest to a near standstill in coastal areas and slowed operations in the desert areas and in Arizona.

Farm employment represents the number of family and hired labor working during the survey week. Family labor includes farm operators working on farms I hour or more plus other family members working 15 hours or more without receiving cash wages during the survey week. These data should not be confused with data published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS). The BLS data are derived from a household survey where each member 16 years of age and older is classified as performing farm or nonfarm work on the basis of major activity during the survey week.
