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FARM EMPLOYMENT UP SHARPLY
DURING MAY; HIGHER THAN A YEAR AGO

More than a million workers were added to the total number of persons employed on farms during May of this year, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported today. This increase, of nearly 9 percent, was slightly more than usual. It raised the farm employment total to 12,372,000 persons on June 1, compared with 12,305,000 people estimated to have been working on farms a year earlier.

Sizeable gains in the number of hired hands on farm payrolls largely accounted for the boost in employment totals as of the first of this month. The number of hired workers on farms increased 13 percent during May as compared with a usual seasonal upturn of about 10 percent. More hired hands were working on June 1 than on May 1 in all sections of the country except the Middle Atlantic States. These increases were particularly marked in the South, with cotton chopping rather general, and the oat harvest under way. Early potatoes were being dug in the South Atlantic States. Strawberries were being picked in Kentucky.

Relatively sharp increases in the number of hired workers also were reported for the Rocky Mountain area where beet thinning was in progress on June 1. Upturns were more moderate in the Corn Belt where some late fields were still being planted. Corn was being cultivated, however, over a large part of this area. Soybeans were being planted in many sections. For the country as a whole, the total number of hired hands employed on farms was estimated at 2,929,000 on June 1 as compared with 2,587,000 a month earlier and 2,821,000 a year ago.

The number of family workers on farms also increased rather sharply from May 1 to June 1, although the rise this year was not materially different from the usual seasonal change. The ending of school terms in many sections of the country during May had released considerable number of persons for farm work. Approximately 9,443,000 family workers (including farm operators) are estimated to have been working on farms June 1 as compared with 8,775,000 on the first of May. This was 41,000 less than the estimate for June 1, 1938. Only in the South Atlantic, West North Central, and the Far Western States were the June 1 estimates of employment of family workers larger than a year ago.

FARM EMPLOYMENT DOWN LAST YEAR
IN THE SOUTH ATLANTIC STATES

Employment on farms in the South Atlantic States averaged 2,107,000 persons in 1938, according to a regional study made by the Bureau. This was 28,000 persons, or a little over 1 percent less than a year earlier.

Total farm employment tended to increase in this area from 1930 to 1935 but has declined slightly each year since that time. This trend was determined primarily by changes in the number of family workers actively employed. Census figures indicate that the number of farms increased rapidly in States along the Atlantic Seaboard during the first half of the present decade when activity in the mining and manufacturing industries was depressed seriously. Miners and other industrial workers living on the land began to till the soil more assiduously as their income from usual occupational sources decreased. This brought many new properties into farm operations and in almost every year during the early thirties, the total number of farm family workers (including operators) increased. This trend was reversed after 1935, the average number of family workers declining from 1,702,000 in that year to 1,606,000 persons in 1938.

Changes in the number of hired hands in this area, however, apparently have followed more closely the shifts in the fortunes of commercial agriculture. Beginning with an estimated average of 526,000 hired workers on South Atlantic farms in 1930, the number dwindled to only 481,000 in 1933. A rather sharp recovery from this low point was experienced during the next 3 years, but employment of hired labor on farms again tended downward in 1937 and 1938. Last year, the number of hired farm workers in this area averaged only 501,000 as compared with 530,000 in 1936.
